Motion made and seconded that the report of committee on resolutions be adopted as per report. Motion carried.

C. P. Hancock was elected by acclamation.

The following nominations were made for secretary: Julius Cronin. Julius D. Cronin was elected secretary by acclamation.

LEON WALKER HENRY.

Leon W. Henry, a former resident of this city, passed away in a hospital in Dillon, Montana, Friday morning, at 5:30, April 27, 1928, following an operation for appendicitis to which he submitted on the previous Wednesday. He had been in poor health for the past year although he had been able to work at his trade most of the time.

Leon Walker Henry was born at Lost Nation, Clinton, County, Iowa, October 14, 1874, he was the third son of Mr. and Mrs. H. R. Henry, now deceased. He came to Holt county in the fall of 1884, and resided on the farm near Mineola where he attended school and grew to manhood.

He was united in marriage to Miss Bertha Brown, of Atkinson, in 1901, no children were born to this union. He was later separated and was remarried at Bozeman, Montana, to Miss Ethel Lee, to which union one son was born.

Lee learned the printing profession early in life and followed its various branches until his death. He owned and published the Atkinson Graphic about 1901; later he was associated with his brother, George, in the publication of a Butte, Nebraska, paper; he also owned a paper at Eugene, Oregon, at one time. He was employed on the Plainview News for several years. He went west a number of years ago and has been employed on several western publications among which were at Butte and Dillon, Montana. He was working on a newspaper in Oakland, California, at the time of the earthquake in 1906. The deceased leaves a son, Donald,

about thirteen year old, who resides with his grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. E. A. Lee, Bozeman, Montana; one sister, Mrs. George Tomlinson, Opportunity; three brothers, Archie L., South Omaha, Nebraska; George M., Hanover, Montana, and Ernest D., O'Neill.

Funeral services and burial were at Bozeman, Montana, Sunday afternoon.

MRS MARY CACANAUGH.

The funeral services for Mrs. Mary Cavanaugh were held Saturday morning at nine o'clock conducted by Monsignor M. F. Cassidy; burial was in Calvary cemetery.

Mary Kegley was born in Ireland, about seventy-five years ago. She came to America and made her home in the east. She was united in marriage to Morris Cavanaugh in 1880, in Sheffield, Illinois. She and her husband later resided in Danbury, Iowa, before coming to Holt county in the fall of 1887; they located upon a homestead eleven miles south of O'Neill which was her home until her death. Her death was caused by heart trouble.

Mrs. Cavanaugh was one of the early pioneers of the west and endured the many hardships that was the lot of the early settlers. The development and progress of Holt county is due largely to those early settlers who blazed the trail and made it possible for the younger generation to live in comparative comfort.

She leaves six children: Mrs. W. J. Sparks, O'Neill; Mrs. Earl Hatton, Chambers; Chas. John, James and Morris Cavanaugh, of O'Neill. Twenty-eight grand children and three great grandchildren; one brother, Michael Kegley, who resides in the east, and two sisters, Mrs. Bracken, Bridgeport, Connecticut, and Mrs. Donlin, Hartford, Connecticut, were unable to attend the funeral services.

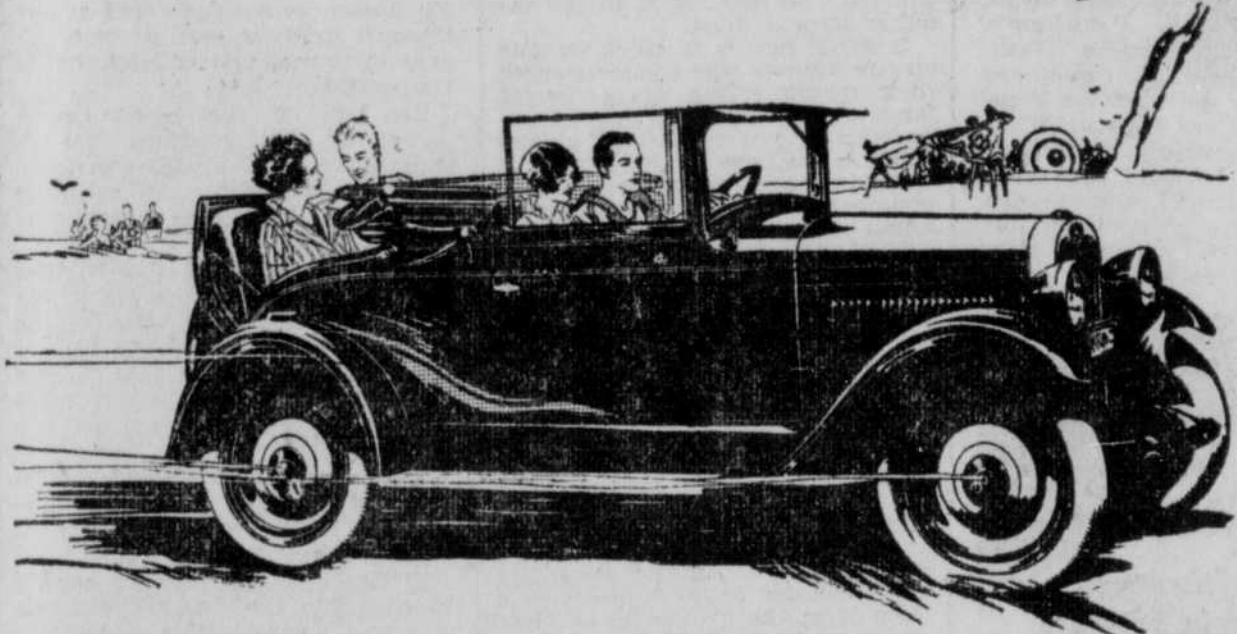

The apparent discrepancy in time simply represents the immense distance between the two points.
