O'NEILL VET OF TWO YEARS HAS BEEN IN SAME OFFICE ROOMS FORTY YEARS

(Billy J. Beha in Sioux City Journal) O'Neill, Neb., June 17—Joseph Meredith holds the record for long occupancy of the same office in O'Neill. His office is in the National Bank building, and he has occupied it 40 years.

The building was erected by Mr. Meredith and two other O'Neill citizens in 1888.
Mr. Meredith came to Holt county in May, 1885, having been sent here by Judge Dundee, of the United States district court of Nebraska, by request of the secretary of the interior, from Washington, to take filings and proofs of public lands for the interior department.

The United States land office at that time was located in Niobrara, Nebraska, with no railroad accommodations to reach the place. Settlers went on horseback, in lumber wagons, and some walked the distance.
In 1890 Mr. Meredith helped from the O'Neill Abstract company, with his office in the present location.

Mr. Meredith has been a captain in the United States army, was admitted to the bar in Iowa, served in the world war, the Spanish American war, and in many Indian uprisings in South Dakota. In 1884 he organized a military company in O'Neill.

NEBRASKA EARLY SETTLERS ACTIVE DESPIE AGES; SHE IS A BAKER

(Billy J. Beha in Sioux City Journal) O'Neill, Neb., June 11: Two of O'Neill's early settlers, Mr. and Mrs. H. J. Zimmermann, have distinguished themselves by their activity despite their ages. Mr. Zimmermann, at 77, is at his place of business every day, and has been for nearly 35 years, while Mrs. Zimmermann, formerly a hotel operator here, at 67, bakes 25 to 30 dozen of rolls daily. Both were born and reared in Germany, and married there, and in 1888 came to the United States, settling at once in Holt county. They have remained here ever since. On arriving here, Mrs. Zimmermann went to school with her children, to learn the English language. She had had a good education in Germany. Both say that early days were hard, and both had to work, getting someone to take care of their children. They are the parents of five living children.
