Amelia Rejoices Over Location of State Highway Through Town.

16,929.60 little village of Amelia, 30 miles south of here, Saturday swarmed with ranch-18,102.56 ers, farmers and business men from 7,632.58 Holt, Rock, Keya Paha and Garfield 2,341.26 counties, for one of the biggest good road rallies ever held in this part of 27,568.80 the state. More than a thousand of 283.58 them, cattle men, hog men, hay men, 4,286.10 dairy men, merchants—rubbed elbows 690.50 and talked roads with the largest 52,837.60 delegation of state officials ever to 1,013.90 visit this county.

On the speakers' platform was R. 11,815.22 W. McGinnis, general agent, Chicago & North Western at Lincoln, who owns \$985,338.06 a ranch adjacent to Amelia and has never ceased to take an active part in the development of Holt county. The meeting was planned as a celebration because of the locating of highway No. 54 between Atkinson and Burwell. This highway, when completed, will be the connecting link north and south between the Elkhorn valley in north central Nebraska and the Platte valley and cross state highways in the southern part of the state.

Mr. Randall gave a most interesting talk, calling the hay men's attention to applications now pending before interstate commerce commission to increase hay rates on western lines and action by the state railway commission to protect the Nebraska hay men.

Mr. Steward stressed the need of good roads for the farmers and also the great need in Holt county for a county extension agent, and in consequence, after his talk, a petition was prepared and many signatures secured, requesting the county board to take action necessary in this di-

The party of state officials, chaperoned by Mr. McGinnis, arrived in Atkinson Friday evening and were guests of the Atkinson commercial club at a dinner at the Leland hotel and a reception at the city park house during a concert played by the Atkinson band. They stayed over night in Atkinson, and Saturday morning drove the thirty miles to Amelia.

Other features of the program were music by the Atkinson band, a ball game betwen Atkinson and Ballagh, foot races, horse races, broncho rid-ing and other minor sports. One of the outstanding events of the day, and one which shows the hospitality of the people of the Amelia community, came at noon when fifteen ladies un-der the direction of Mrs. M. L. Sageser opened the little school house and took charge of free serving of fried chicken, salads, sandwiches, baked beans, cakes, pies, ice tea and coffee to more than 500 people.
