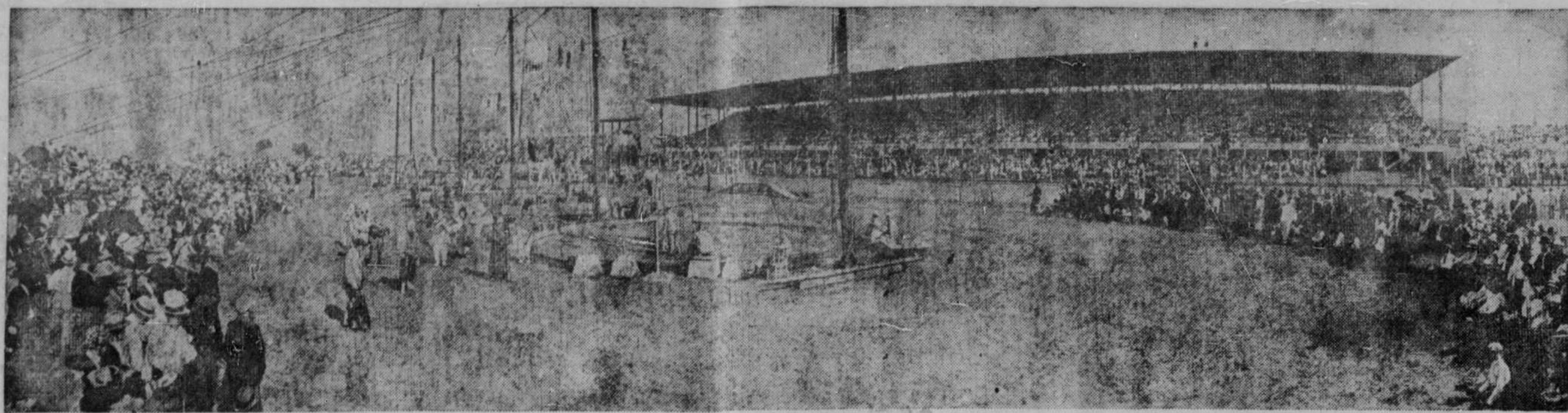

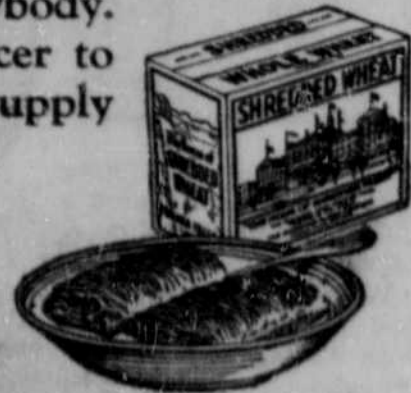

that the shares of stock of said bank should be subject to a levy of five mills on the actual valuation thereof, and no more, under Class B, Intangibles, as referred to in Chapter 169 of the Session Laws of Nebraska for the year 1927.

AND WHEREAS, there is now held by the County Treasurer the following sums to which said banks are entitled to a refund under the holding of the Supreme Court, to-wit:

First National Bank, of O'Neill, Neb. County Taxes \$262.68

Bond Levy for School District No. 7 146.45

O'Neill National Bank of O'Neill, Nebraska: County Taxes 220.63

Bond Levy for School District No. 7 123.06

First National Bank of Stuart, Nebraska: County Taxes 51.13

Bond levy for School District No. 44 31.00

First National Bank of Atkinson, Nebraska: County Taxes 196.79

Bond levy for School District No. 21 376.25

Bond levy for the City of Atkinson 378.96

AND WHEREAS, it now appearing that under the law said amounts should be refunded by the County Treasurer to the said named taxpayers.

THEREFORE, I move you, Mr. Chairman, that the County Treasurer be, and he hereby is authorized, empowered and directed to pay over to said named taxpayers respectively the said amounts to which they are entitled, as in this resolution stated.
