

Fire Training Given Hospital

On this week's hot Tuesday afternoon, the employees of St. Anthony's hospital were making things even hotter at the Barnard Allen home.

This was the first of a series of classes in first-aid fire fighting and instruction in emergency removal of patients in case of fire in the hospital. The course is being presented by Mrs. William Kelley of Inman, Mrs. Roy Hamrich and Bernard Allen, O'Neill, who represented the staff at a course of instructions given recently at Des Moines, Iowa by Lt. McGrath of the Chicago fire department.

Tuesday each hospital employee took an active part in extinguishing several fires using towels, blankets, and fire extinguishers. The class will be followed by individual and group instructions in the actual removal of patients, handling of fire hoses, which are located in strategic areas in hospital corridors, and taking part in actual fire drills. "Fire fighting begins with fire safety" and with this in mind the staff requests that all personnel and visitors observe and heed our NO SMOKING signs in certain areas and in rooms posted where oxygen is in use.
