Orange French Toast Waffles (Two or Three Servings)

1 egg, slightly beaten

1/4 cup milk

1 1/2 teaspoons finely grated orange rind

1/4 cup orange juice

1 teaspoon lime juice

2 tablespoons sugar

4-5 slices day old bread

Softened butter

Combine egg, milk, orange rind, orange juice and lime juice; add sugar. Beat until well mixed.

Spread butter on both sides of bread slices. Dip bread into egg-milk mixture. Then bake in moderately hot waffle iron until browned.
