LIEUTENANT OBERMIRE TELLS OF FLIGHT TO IRAN

1st Lt. and Mrs. John P. Obermire and daughters, Irene, Diana, Kathy and Patty Su are living near Frankfurt, Germany, where the lieutenant is a pilot of light planes and helicopters in the air section of the V Corps.

The following is an excerpt from a letter received by lieutenant Obermire's parents, Mr. and Mrs. G. L. Obermire of Stuart, written while he was in Teheran, Iran.

"I left Frankfurt, Germany on June 24th and went to Woenndrecht, Holland. There were fourteen pilots and seven mechanics. We test flew and accepted seven L-20 type aircraft. We left the next day and went to Dijon, France, and stayed the night in Marseilles, France. The next day brought us as far as Rome, Italy. At Rome we were delayed three days while we obtained permission to enter some Middle East countries. From Rome we went to Brindisi, Italy, to await our over water escort. An air force SA-16 Amphibian escorted us across the water to Athens, Greece.

The following day we continued on to Rhodes and finally to Beirut, Lebanon. After we landed we found out our clearance to enter their country had been cancelled. The police locked up our aircraft and pointedly suggested that we should not leave town.
