Yearling steers 27.50 - 29.50; Just good 26.00 - 27.25—Heifers largely 25.50 - 26.50 a few to 27.00, catty kinds down to 22.00. 800 - 900 lb. Steers 24.75 - 25.50 and in limited supply this week. 1 medium onion
1 cup water
1 cup tomato juice
1/2 cup green pepper
1 tablespoon salt
2 eggs
1/2 cup bread crumbs
1/2 cup water
1/2 cup tomato juice
1/2 cup green pepper
1/2 cup salt
1/2 cup margarine

Chop onion, brown onion and celery in lard. Combine with green pepper, salt, egg, bread crumbs and water. Add meat. Mix well. For best results, drain (1/2 cup) to the meat, adding salt. For our best meat loaf, use 1/2 cup tomato juice. Cover with remaining dressing, then top with remaining mixture. Bake in a moderate oven (350° F.) 1 1/2 hours. Bake twice with tomato juice and butter or margarine to keep loaf moist.
