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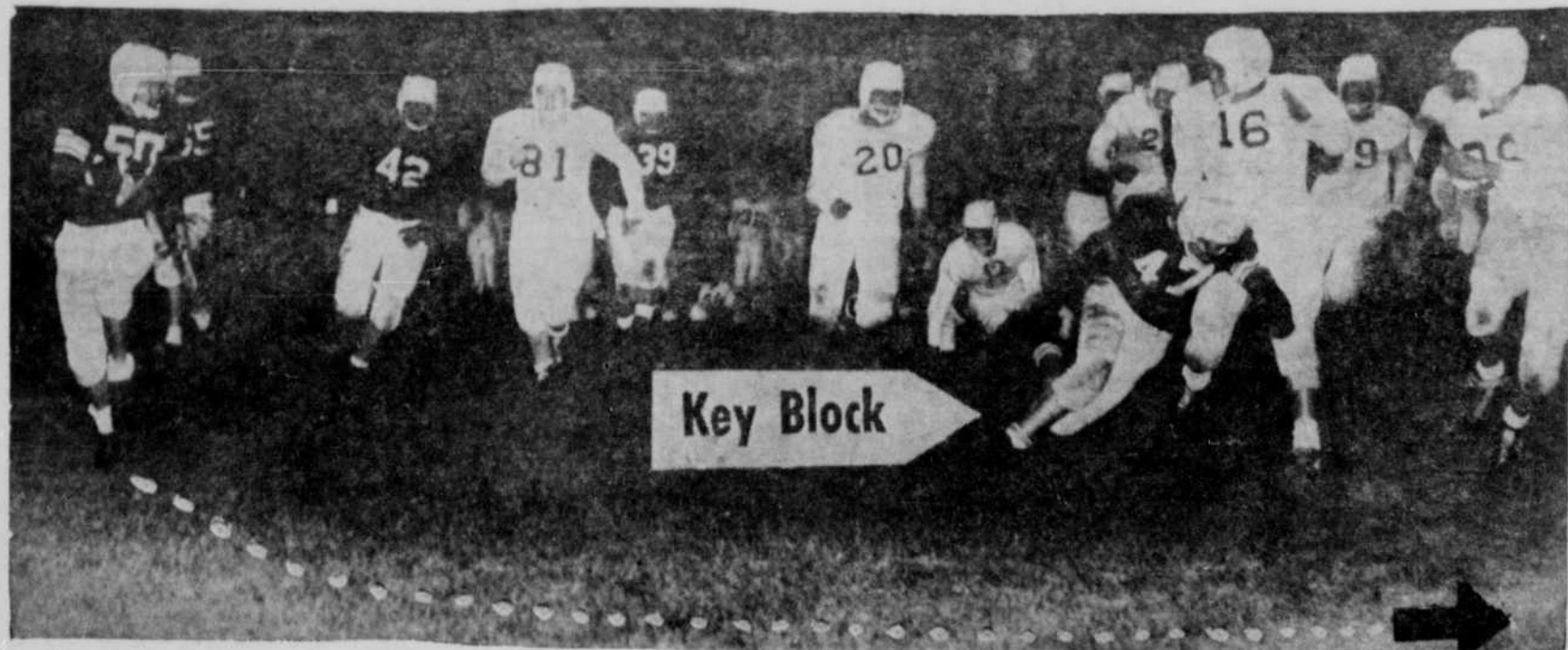

## SMA Gets Clipping at St. Cecelia's Hands

The St. Mary's Cardinals took their second defeat of the season squarely on the chin Saturday night at the hands of St. Cecelia's of Hastings 18 to 14, a Nebraska football power.

The Cardinals, weak in the line after losing Ronnie Holly and Art Wills last week with injuries, played spotty and inconsistent football. Despite the known power of the Hawks, however, the Cardinals played a tight ball game, looked good in the statistics but couldn't take advantage of their breaks.

The ball game was primarily a contest of St. Mary's power and St. Cecelia's speed, and the Hawks made the most of a slower Academy secondary.

Here is a rundown of key plays by quarters:

**1st Quarter**  
St. Mary's began a drive from their own 25 after stopping St. Cecelia's opening thrust. The Cards drove to the Hawk 15 where they were plagued with their first fumble. Cal Peters, sophomore center for SMA, pounced on a loose ball the next play. Stevens later skirted the left end for the first TD and Hynes added the point.

**2nd Quarter**  
The Hawks were momentarily delayed but on a 3rd and 13 situation sprung their feet footed fullback up the middle for 29 yards into the end zone. The conversion try was unsuccessful.

The Hawks returned a Card punt to their own 40 late in the 2nd period and John Kealy, 134 pound standout sophomore for St. Cecelia weaved his way through the entire Cardinal defense for a 61-yard touchdown. Again the try failed but St. Cecelia went out in front.

**3rd Quarter**  
The Cardinals fired up their own rosters at the start of the second half and for a few plays looked as though they might upset the Hastings crew. Beginning on their own 31, they drove 69 yards in 8 plays for a touchdown. Stevens went across from the 5 and Jim Shoemaker added the extra point.

Late in the third period Randolph, with the aid of his angry linemen, went across from the 5 after a drive from the Academy 29-yard line.

**4th Quarter**  
The Cards then racked up 20 straight first downs to the Hawks

13 yard line where the Hawks got tough and held. Neither team seriously threatened after this point although St. Cecelia's Kealy again returned a long punt which served the break in the Cardinals' back.

Spitzberger, sophomore quarterback starting his first game for the Cards, was cited for a fine first job. The forward wall of St. Mary's frequently faced a 9-man defensive line, and with the lack of ability to pass effectively, the Cards took their licking near the scrimmage.

Coach Don Templemeyer said he hoped to see Holly and Wills back in action against Scotia Thursday.

The Cardinals looked a great deal better in the statistics column than might be expected. They gained more ground running and passing, recovered more fumbles, received 18 first downs to their opponents' 5 and were penalized only 20 yards to their opponents 50. The Cardinals controlled the ball for more offensive plays than did St. Cecelia but couldn't get the long gains.

ORCHARD — Plans are being made here for the annual homecoming game this coming Friday. Orchard will take on Brunswick. Both teams have yet to win a game.

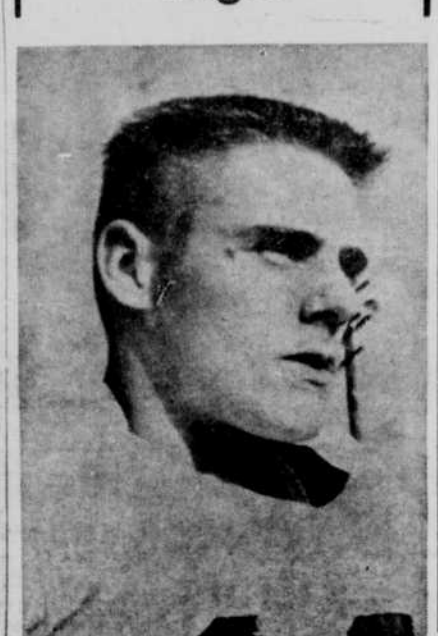
No game was scheduled by Orchard last week.

# Eagles Go, Go, Go As Kilcoin Shines

## O'Neill's 1st Win In Conference

One of the bright stars in the future of O'Neill high school football, sophomore Jerry Kilcoin, weaved his teammates to victory over Bassett 31 to 7 Friday night.

The fleet, young, 152-pound left halfback put on a running display of timing and smart offensive football that warmed the hearts of a weather chilled crowd.

Kilcoin danced 169 yards in 6 plays for an average of 25 yards per carry and was directly responsible for putting the ball in touchdown position most of the night. And, he had a lot of help. John Kurtz and Bill Frick, both defensive tackles, Donald Ermer, right halfback and Dennis Tomlinson, guard, played beautiful offensive and defensive football.

Here are the highlights of O'Neill's third straight victory and first conference win.

**1st Quarter**

O'Neill began hitting hard at the very start of the game and recovered a fumble on the Bassett 28-yard line.

Sparkplug Kilcoin then thrilled the crowd for the first time. He skipped 17 yards to the Bassett 11. Larry Donlin powered for 2 yards and Kilcoin again smacked the center of the line for the first time. O'Neill failed to convert.

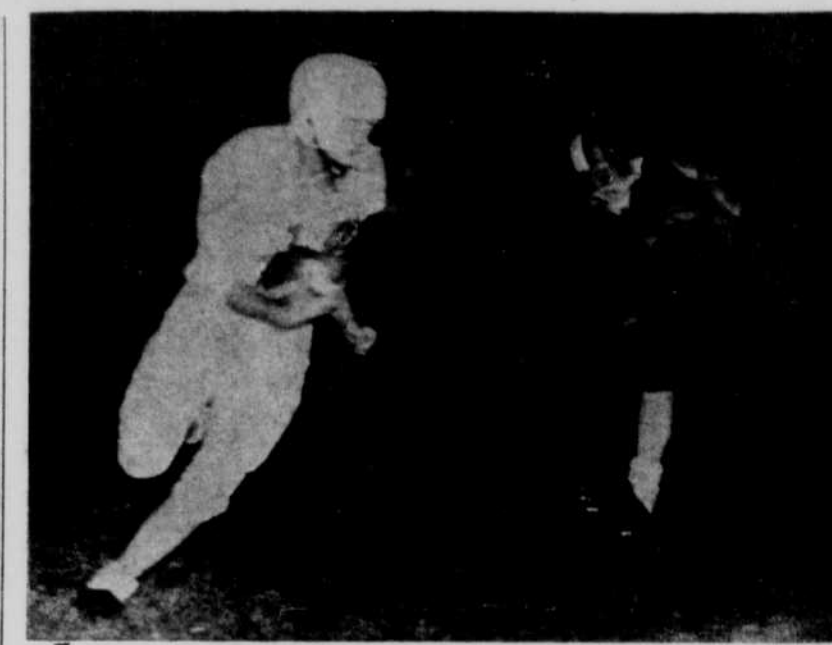
Bassett was held on downs shortly afterwards and were forced to punt. O'Neill returned the ball to the Bassett 46-yard line. Then Kilcoin's magic warmed the cool night air as he ran 46 yards only to be called back because of a clipping penalty.

**2nd Quarter**

It was the 3rd down and 13 yards to go for O'Neill when Bill Eby passed to his twin Bob for a spectacular 38-yard touchdown. O'Neill again failed to convert. Shortly afterwards Bassett scored their only touchdown when Bussinger scored from the 8-yard line.

**3rd Quarter**

The Eagles then held Bassett and Darold Ermer thrilled the fans with a run to the Bassett 25-yard line. Donlin then scored around an end and O'Neill converted.

Bassett completed 3 out of 4 passes on this touchdown drive. With 3 minutes to go in the quarter, Kilcoin again broke loose and ran for 45 thrilling yards to the Bassett 9-yard line. Donlin and Ermer carried to the 1-foot line and Bill Eby rambled for the TD. O'Neill again failed to convert and the half-time score was 18 to 7.

**4th Quarter**  
At this point Coach Jake Hawley sent in the reserves and Kilcoin again, this time with the help of the subs, ran 52 yards to the Bassett 15.

## Ewing Overpowers Stuart 19 - 6; Fans Pleased With Second Win

The Ewing Tigers poured it on a game, but outmatched Stuart eleven last Friday night to take an easy 19-6 win at the Tiger's field in Ewing.

Fine defensive play on the part of the Ewing ends contained the running attack of Stuart's outstanding halfback, Jim Schmaderer, keeping him on the inside and making it possible for the Ewing secondary to move in for the tackles.

The middle of the Ewing line held firm for the entire game and heads-up ball on the part of the secondary resulted in more than one interception—one of which turned into a 55-yard touchdown for Ewing.

Ewing scored first late in the first quarter when quarterback Larry Eacker fired a short pass to the left end, Freddie Wright, who lateraled off to the left half, Ronald Brion. As the Stuart defense ganged Wright, Brion went untouched for 50 yards and six points. The Tigers missed on the point-after try.

Ewing scored again in the second quarter on the Leon-Driving smashes of fullback Leon Hahlbeck. The hefty back carried the ball in a series of plays to the one-yard line from where Harold Parks scored an easy touchdown. The extra point try was again missed.

The first half ended with Ewing leading 12-0 and the possessors of eight first downs to Stuart's one, the latter coming in the closing minutes of the quarter.

Stuart's brief bit of glory came in the early minutes of the second half when they intercepted an Ewing pass on the 20-yard line. Shift Jim Schmaderer skirted the end for 10 yards and two plays later Stuart moved to the five. From there Stuart scored but failed in the extra point attempt.

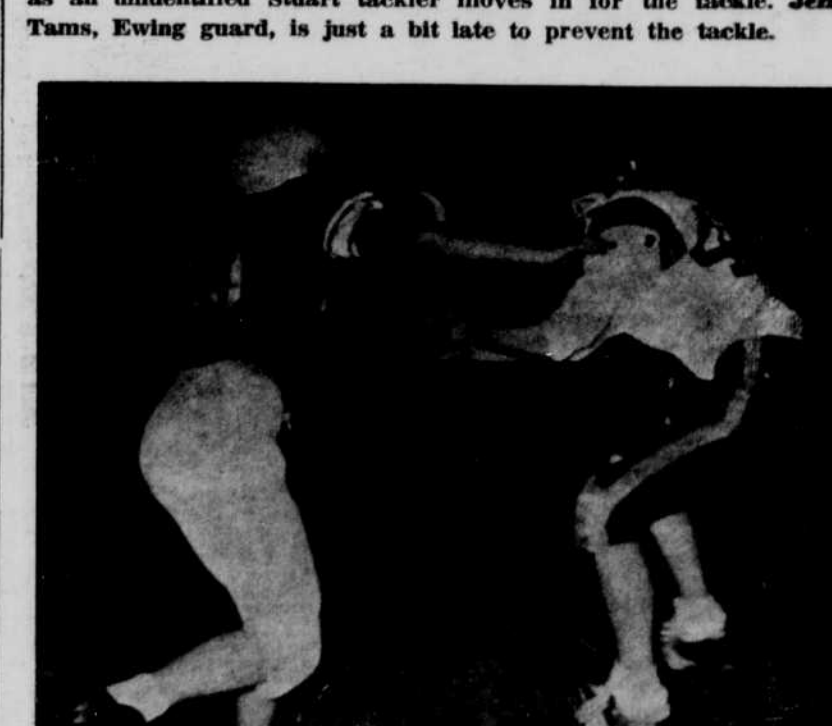
Ewing's final touchdown came on an intercepted pass on their own 45 with a 55-yard return to paydirt by Ronald Brion. Tom Koenig, senior tackle, gets most of the credit for this touchdown as he cleared out a couple of would-be tacklers giving Brion an open road to the end zone.

The Tigers racked up 13 first downs in their second win of the season while Stuart managed only four in suffering their second loss.

The losers showed brief moments of glory during the entire game but could never put together any scoring threat other than their lone touchdown. Outstanding for Stuart were Jerry Steinhauer, Tom Brewster and Dwight Holbrook.
