These are not reported to

be contaminated. Some of the stores have taken them off the shelves however. Bob Papenheimer, of the New Outlaw, said that he has cancelled all orders for cranberries. He has

some Wisconsin cranberries or hand and will sell them. Tom Cronin, manager of the Safeway store here, said that the Safeway chain has pulled off all

of their cranberries and the store here has quit selling them.
Shelhamer's Jack and Jill have a few on hand but didn't expect to get anymore. George Janousek, owner of the 4th Street Market, said that he

would not order anymore until he knew from where he was getting All of the store managers said that the cancellation of orders was
