

Officers and directors of NNTA. STUART—Funeral services for Structed Einar Viren, Omaha attorney, to enter protests with the State Railway Commission, State Aeronautics Commission and Civil Aeronautics Board.

Viren also was instructed to enter into correspondence with management of North Central Air Lines, Ozark Air Lines and Central Air Lines, all classified as "feeder" carriers, to determine if one of those carriers would be interested in succeeding Frontier in Nebraska.

NNTA President J. G. Brewster, Stuart banker, said a committee would be appointed to represent the association at meetings and hearings. A save-the-planes meeting is scheduled Friday evening

Meanwhile, NNTA is considering asking the State Railway Commission to order Chicago and North Western Railway company to restore Omaha-Chadron-Omaha passenger service if all efforts fail to keep at least one roundtrip plane schedule in force. When the group was known as the Save-the-Trains Association, it battled four years to keep trains 13 and 14 on the 450-mile line only to see rail passenger service suspended July 7,


