Serve Pineapple Muffins Suggests Rex Stowell Women who like to serve delicate little muffins that are on the sweet side with salad luncheons will especially enjoy this pineapple muffin recipe sent to us by Rex Stowell local salesman of the Meadow Golf Dairy. It is made with the dairy egg nog which the company is featuring for the next two months. Beatrice Cooke, home economics director of the Chicago test kitchens, developed the recipe. Egg Nog Pineapple Muffins (18-20 small) 2 cups sifted flour 1/2 teaspoon salt 1/4 cup drained crushed pineapple 1/4 teaspoon cinnamon 1/4 teaspoon nutmeg 1/2 cup brown sugar, firmly packed 1 egg, slightly beaten 1 1/4 cups egg nog 1/4 cup butter, melted 1 cup drained crushed pineapple Sifted confectioners' sugar-cinnamon mixture. Sift together flour, baking powder, salt and spices. Mix in brown sugar. Combine egg, egg nog and butter; add to dry ingredients mixing just until moistened. Fold in pineapple. Fill greased muffin pans half full. Lightly sprinkle top of each muffin with confectioners' sugar-cinnamon mixture. Bake at 375 degrees for 20 minutes.
