NOTICE TO TAX PAYERS

Assessing date has been changed to

January 1 to February 29

All property will be assessable as of January 1st. Everyone between the age of 21 and 60 are required by law to file a schedule for head tax and personal property. If you are under 21 and over 60 and own property, you are required to make a personal property schedule. All personal property schedules will be checked against mortgages that are on record and spot checks will be made to determine if personal property is assessed cor-

If you are administrator or guardian of an estate, you are required by law to make out a schedule for the estate. There is a severe penalty attached to the law. If you are an administrator or guardian and do not understand the law, you had better consult your attorney in regard to the law so you can assess the property correctly. This law also applies to property that is not in estates. If you own real estate that a trailer house is sitting on, you are required by law to notify the assessor about the trailer house.


Precinct assessors will start to work January 4th. The precinct assessor will only work during the month of January except where the assessor has the town and precinct also, then a longer period will be allowed. If weather conditions are good, the precinct assessors will be anxious to get their work done as soon as possible. Please cooperate with them in getting your assessing done as soon as possible. Rules and regulations set forth by the State Tax Commissioner will be followed by all

Business schedules will be mailed out, personal schedules will be available at the Court House or from any assessor.
