Choc-O-Chip Dessert
(Four-Six Servings)
2 cups hot chocolate milk
2 eggs, beaten
1/4 cup sugar
1/4 cup flour
1/4 teaspoon salt
1 teaspoon vanilla
1/2 cup semi-sweet chocolate pieces
Miniature marshmallows

Gradually beat sugar into eggs. Stir in flour and salt. Slowly add chocolate milk to egg mixture. Cook over boiling water until slightly thickened, about 10 minutes, stirring constantly. Remove from heat. Cool for about 15 minutes. Stir in vanilla and chocolate pieces. Spoon into sherbet glasses or dessert dishes. Top with marshmallows.
