



Storz Feeds Starving Birds

A seven-state program of feeding birds which cannot find food because of lingering snow is being carried out under the direction of Arthur C. Storz, Sr. of Omaha.

The program evolved through the desire of the Storz Brewing Company board chairman to make a personal effort to relieve the situation of starving song and game birds throughout the snow-covered Midwest. The program began just as the snows stopped and will be

continued as long as the ground is covered, Mr. Storz said.

The brewing executive gathered several tons of small grain and had it put up in red-striped sacks, each of which contains about 15 pounds of grain. Storz distributor trucks from Nebraska, Iowa, Minnesota, South Dakota, Wyoming, Kansas and Missouri are picking up the sacks at the brewery in Omaha.

The distributors are getting the grain to the birds through cooperation of rural mail carriers.

Many Storz distributors are not only distributing grain received from the brewery but are also buying grain locally and getting it

placed where birds can benefit from it.

Each grain sack bears instructions for use. The directions from Mr. Storz, who is a former member of the Nebraska Game, Forestation and Parks Commission, are as follows: "Scrape an area bare to the ground with either a scraper or a shovel. Place a suitable amount of grain in a pile. Do not scatter! Also do not place immediately adjacent to a main-traveled highway as it will cause further bird loss from automobiles."
