### Fruit Plate Combinations Suggest Owen Parkinson

With April arriving like the proverbial lamb, let's turn our meal-time food thoughts to salads. Crisp, tart and refreshing salads play a big part in most spring meals. And we want them to be beautiful, too.

Most fruit and vegetable salad combinations are greatly improved nutritionally when served with a mound of cottage cheese, we are reminded by Owen Parkinson, local salesman of the Meadow Gold Dairy. It provides the protein that may be lacking in the other foods.

For example, here are several salad combinations that team well with cottage cheese, which Beatrice Cooke, director of the company's Chicago test kitchens, has developed.

**Fruit Plate Combinations**  
1. Peach halves filled with cranberry-orange relish; banana slices dipped in lemon juice; sweetened fresh or frozen blueberries.  
2. Pear halves filled with Tokay grapes; sweetened fresh or frozen strawberries with a lime wedge.  
3. Slice of unpared apple; orange slices; grapefruit segment; avocado slices dipped in lemon juice; sweet dark cherries.

**Vegetable Plate Combinations**  
1. Cooked green beans, carrot slices, cauliflowerets marinated in French dressing.  
2. Slices of scored, unpared cucumber; red onion slices, raddish slices.  
3. Cooked asparagus spears; plum or cherry tomatoes marinated in oil and vinegar dressing flavored with herbs.
