Burney received 665 votes. Frank Marsh had 1,346 votes for secretary of state. Ray Johnson received 1,214 for auditor, Rollin Clark had 684 for treasurer. Clarence Meyer received 606 votes for attorney general and Richard Larson had 524 for railway commissioner.
For congressman, Dave Martin led Monroe Bixler by 103 votes.
On the county republican ticket, Frank Cronk was nominated supervisor in the fourth district, Walt Smith was nominated in the sixth district. The democratic candidate in the second district, Mike Landreth, will run unopposed. Cronk will face Martin Helmrichs in the fourth district and Smith will face A. M. Batenhorst in the sixth district in November.

DEMOCRATIC PARTY—For president, John F. Kennedy received 809 votes. L. D. Putnam polled 528 votes for fourth district delegate. For Senator, Ralph Brooks received 412 votes here in Holt county and also the right throughout the state to face incumbent Carl Curtis in November.

Robert Conrad received the most Holt county votes for governor, Edward Dosek was the leader for lieutenant governor, Robert Dixon for secretary of state. Alan Jogan for auditor, Richard Larson for treasurer, Hal Bauer for attorney general, Fred Sorensen for railway commissioner and Donald McGinley had 899 votes for representative to congress from the fourth district.

NON-POLITICAL—Director of Elkhorn rural power, J. P. Galen, 79 votes. For legislator, 28th district, Frank Nelson, 1,784; Ora Yarges, 836 votes.

For 4th district judge, Norman Gonderinger, 1,480; Wm. Smith, 540 and Wm. Brennan, 581. Louis Reimer had 2,341 votes for county judge.
The large turn-out could be attributed to the favorable weather here election day. County clerk Ken Waring said that absentee ballots are not likely to change any of the standings.
