Chili Ham Dish A Hearty Main Dish Suggests O. Parkinson

Here's a hearty main dish to cook over the backyard grill or on top of the kitchen range one warm evening soon. Called chili ham, it is a slumgullion type of dish recommended to us by Owen Parkinson, local salesman of the Meadow Gold Dairy, for those lazy days when elaborate cooking doesn't appeal.

The dish contains all the essential nutrients though, according to Beatrice Cooke, director of the company's Chicago test kitchens where the recipe was created—rice for your carbohydrates, ham for your protein, and skim milk for your dairy food. Buttery bread and crisp relishes will round out the meal.

- Chili Ham Dish (Four-Six Servings) 3/4 cup uncooked rice 2 tablespoons butter 1 small onion, chopped 1 teaspoon salt 2 teaspoons chili powder 2 cubes cubed cooked ham 1 No. 303 can red kidney beans 2 1/2 cups skim milk

Cook rice in butter until lightly browned. Add onion and cook 5 minutes. Stir in seasonings. Add ham, kidney beans and skim milk. Cover; cook over moderate heat, stirring occasionally, until rice is tender. (About 20 minutes for pre-cooked rice.) Add more skim milk if rice is too dry.

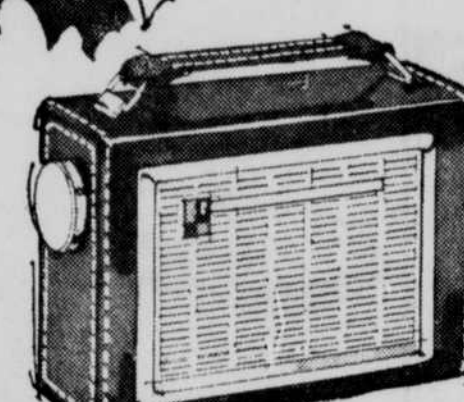

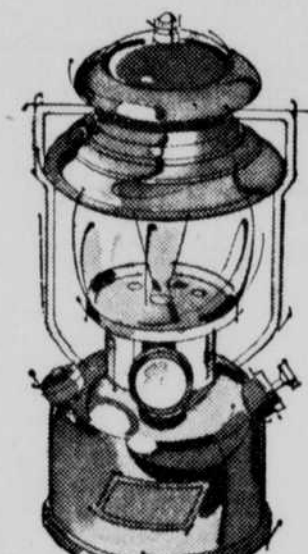

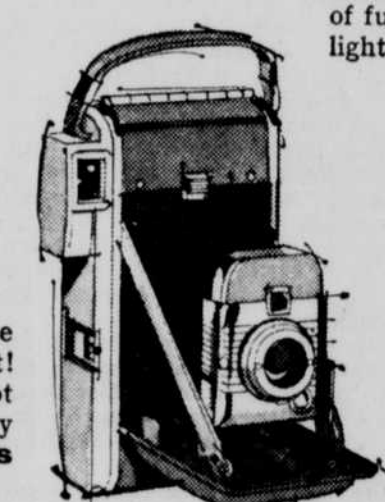
