## O'Neill Residents Petition Council Against Trailer Park

Fifteen O'Neill citizens appeared before the O'Neill city council at their regular meeting Tuesday night and petitioned that the trailer park located at Seventh and Fremont breaks a city ordinance.

The petition states that businesses may not be constructed in designated residential areas. The area in question is a recognized residential district.

In 1947 a city planning commission established that certain parts of the city would be designated as business, residential and sub-residential areas. The 1947 city council passed the zoning recommendations.

Four trailers are parked in the area now. Fines of from \$10 to \$100 could be levied against the property owner for breaking a city ordinance.

In other council action the franchise granted Consumers Public Power company was extended. The council also purchased a Allis-Chalmers motor patrol for \$16,000.15. The old patrol was traded in.

The council also granted two new house building permits, a Drive-In lunch building permit and a garage building permit.

The accident happened about 8 a.m. Sunday.

## Holt Pioneer Identifies Old Kincaid Picture

Clayton Mesner, who lives here in O'Neill, informed the Frontier this week that the picture published last week depicting a long-ago scene in the city was the signing for land after the passing of the Kincaid Act.

The Kincaid Act, named after the Nebraska legislator who introduced it into Congress, stipulated that everyone homesteading 160 acres could automatically receive a full section of land. The Act was passed in the very early 1900's.

Paul Shamer, O'Neill, says he was 19 years old when this picture was taken and that he was in the line to receive land. He was too young for a grant however.

Mr. Mesner was homesteading northwest of Swan Lake and received his section of land.

The line-up shown in last week's Frontier was caused by the stipulation that all those who wanted to sign up for a section of land had to do so at the land office.

At that time the land office was located where the telephone office is now. Men started lining up about dark the night before the office opened and by midnight the line stretched to what is now the Consumer's Public Power office.

They stood in line all night and early the next morning, according to Mesner, a fellow started at the beginning of the line and took the name and address of everyone. The men were numbered and received land according to their number.

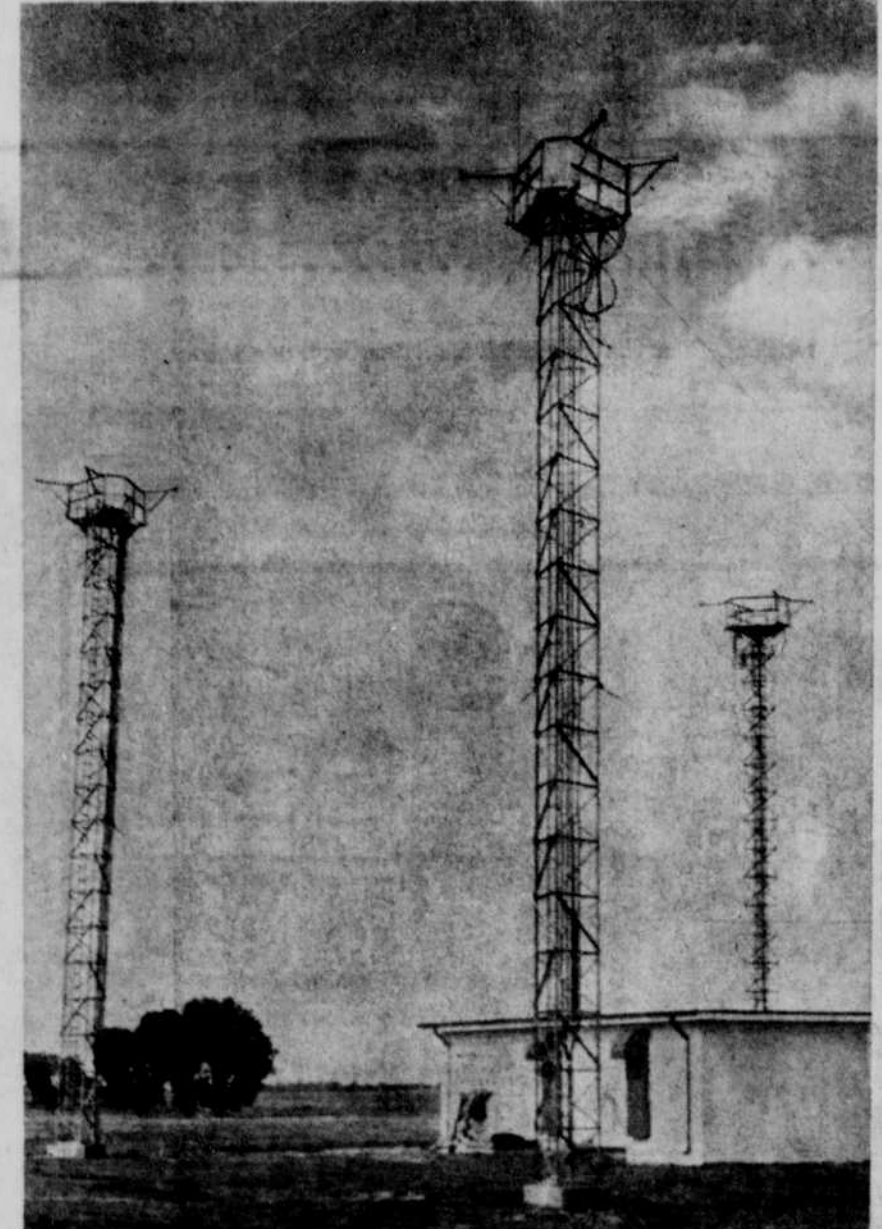

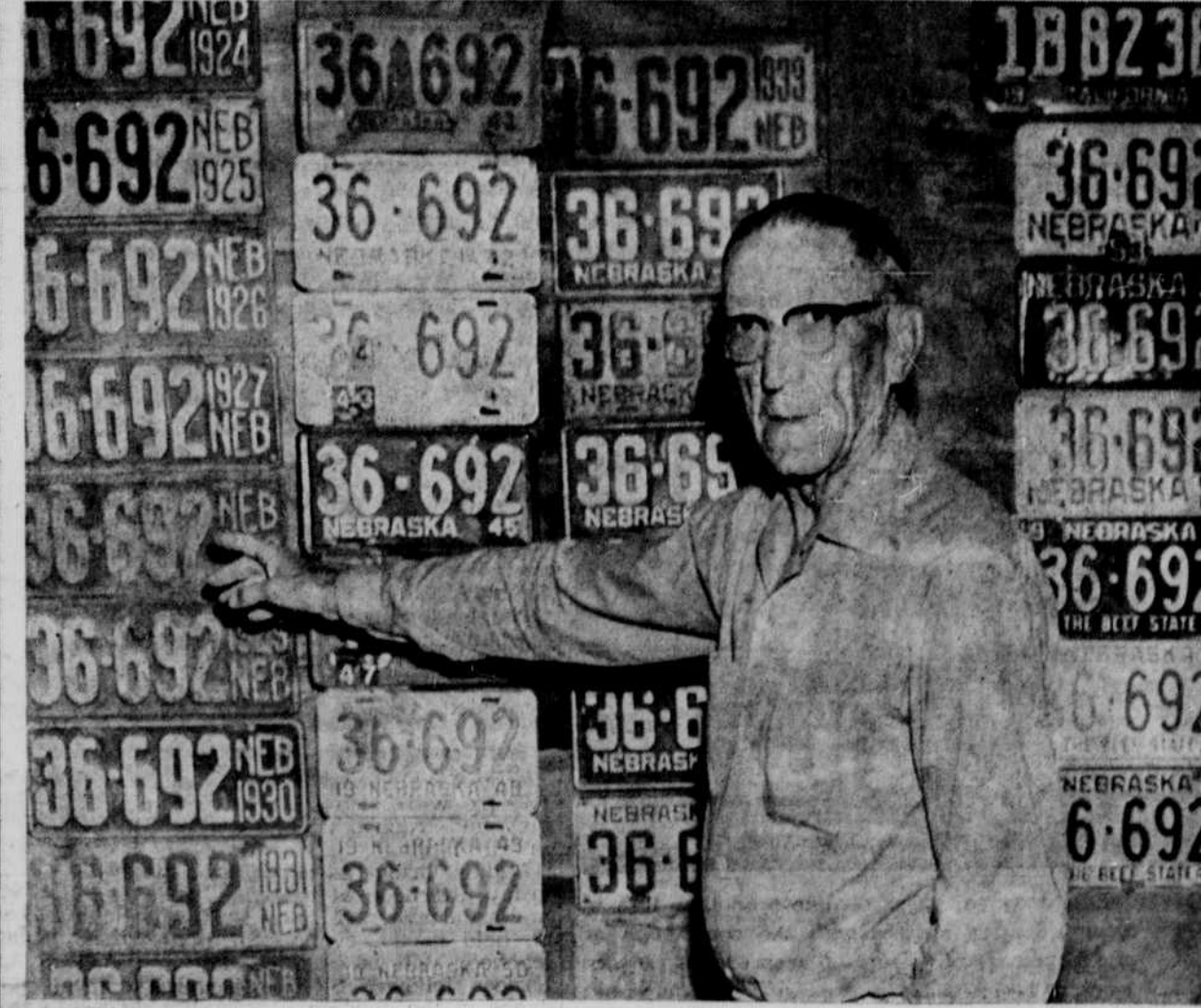

The Federal Aviation Agency will soon complete another link in their ground to air communication system with the completion of this installation one mile northeast of Emmet. Three 60 foot towers have been raised and work is now being done on the radio equipment and stand-by power unit. In case of an electrical outage, the unit would automatically turn on to supply power. The transmitter will be connected by a wire system to headquarters in Denver and messages broadcast there will be relayed from this center. Messages sent by planes in this area will also be picked up and relayed to Denver. Both UHF and VHF transmitters and receivers will be located in the unit. W. W. Winkler of Kansas City is the contractor in charge. The station is scheduled to go into operation in September or October.



Les Lines of Page has been in the process of accumulating material for a collection for the past 44 years that he could not duplicate now if he wished. Mr. Lines became a car license collector quite by accident, first tacking them up on the end of his garage each year as he placed the new number on his car. First thing he knew he had the evidence showing where some of his money went each year. He has had three numbers—28030 up to 1916, then 36-693 in 1922. Since then he has settled steadily for 36-692.
