Capitol News - Gasoline Tax Shows Decline During Winter

The Nebraska Press Association LINCOLN—It's summer in Nebraska and the memories of the long winter are fading. But effects of the cold and snow continue to show up in state business.

For instance, gasoline tax collections have finally caught up with the pace set last year. They dragged during the first five months of the year. The reason was the long, hard winter which discouraged highway travel and farm work. May gasoline tax collections totaled some \$3.8 million, compared with \$3.6 million for the same month in 1959 and \$2.8 million for April of this year.

Total collections so far this year amount to \$14.6 million, just a few thousand dollars more than the total for the same period a year ago.

Gasoline taxes are one of the main sources of state revenue. The highway department, meanwhile, is still wrestling with break-up of roads in some areas caused by the freezing and thawing of the cold spring.

There was trouble of another type on the Interstate Highway where settling of the ground has caused dips in the super road between Gretna and Omaha. This is the same area where the department tried once before to pump dirt underneath the pavement to keep the concrete from cracking.

Department officials, however, do not blame the sinking on construction or the winter but on settling of ground below the route. To avoid this in other areas where "fills" of dirt have to be made, the department is allowing about a year for the material hauled in to settle.

Sell Nebraska Dan Dierckx, chief of the State Resources Division, has not lessened his desire to "sell Nebraska" to outstate industry.

Osterhout says he has come up with a plan to speed up industrial development of the Cornhusker state and will present this to the division's advisory committee June 15.

Interest in bringing more industry to Nebraska—the function of the division's advisory committee with the release of the 1960 census figures for Nebraska. Figures show the state had a population hike but in the last 10 years this has not kept up with the national average.

Osterhout is an enthusiastic booster of the benefits of Nebraska. He said his plan will attempt to increase advertising and personal contacts to let industries know what Nebraska has to offer.

The division chief says he will also establish greater contact with communities so that information sought by prospective industries on a community can be readily supplied.

He added that there will be an attempt to increase research facilities to compile data for presentation to industries. The advisory committee is composed of nine members appointed by the governor with the State Director of Agriculture, currently Pearl Finigan, as chairman.

Potato Development One of the smaller divisions of state government is the Division of Potato Development, an agency of the State Agriculture Department. It was established in 1945 by the Legislature to develop and promote the state's spud crop.

Through education and research, the division assists growers in increasing yield and improving quality and promotes better practices and methods in the production, storage, grading and shipping of potatoes.

Potato shippers are licensed by the division. The licensed shipper pays a tax of a half cent a hundred pounds on the spuds. This is the only income received by the division which has the Agriculture Director as chairman of an eight-member committee.

Scissors proposes that the state be divided into 12 districts. State offices would be established in each for the issuance of license plates, registration certificates, driving licenses and motor vehicle titles.

He says many counties are complaining that the cost of issuing titles, plates and licenses, is more than the amount they get from the state for doing the job. The new proposals, Scissors says, would give the state "absolute control" over the licensing of all Nebraska drivers. He earlier proposed fee boosts.

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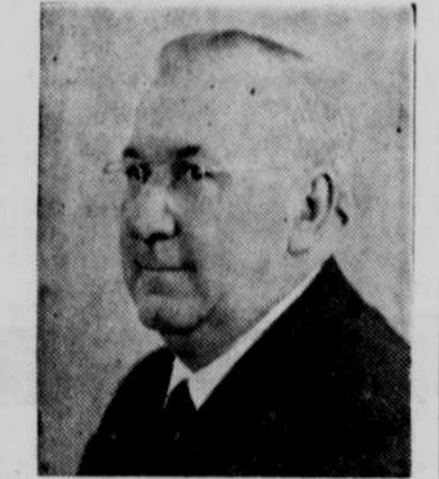
