The hobby is not a new one for Mrs. Barnes. A lifetime of interest and a good many dollars have been spent on the subject. As a child, Mrs. Barnes recalls that she walked two and one-half miles with a quarter clutched in her hand to buy a doll and some material for a doll dress and that she always bought dolls instead of candy when she had money to spend.

Mrs. Barnes' living room is devoted to the dolls and they are on display at all times. They are seated in high-chairs, rocking chairs, on the sofa and several

In the collection of some 70 dolls there are only six which have brown eyes. The rest of course are blue.

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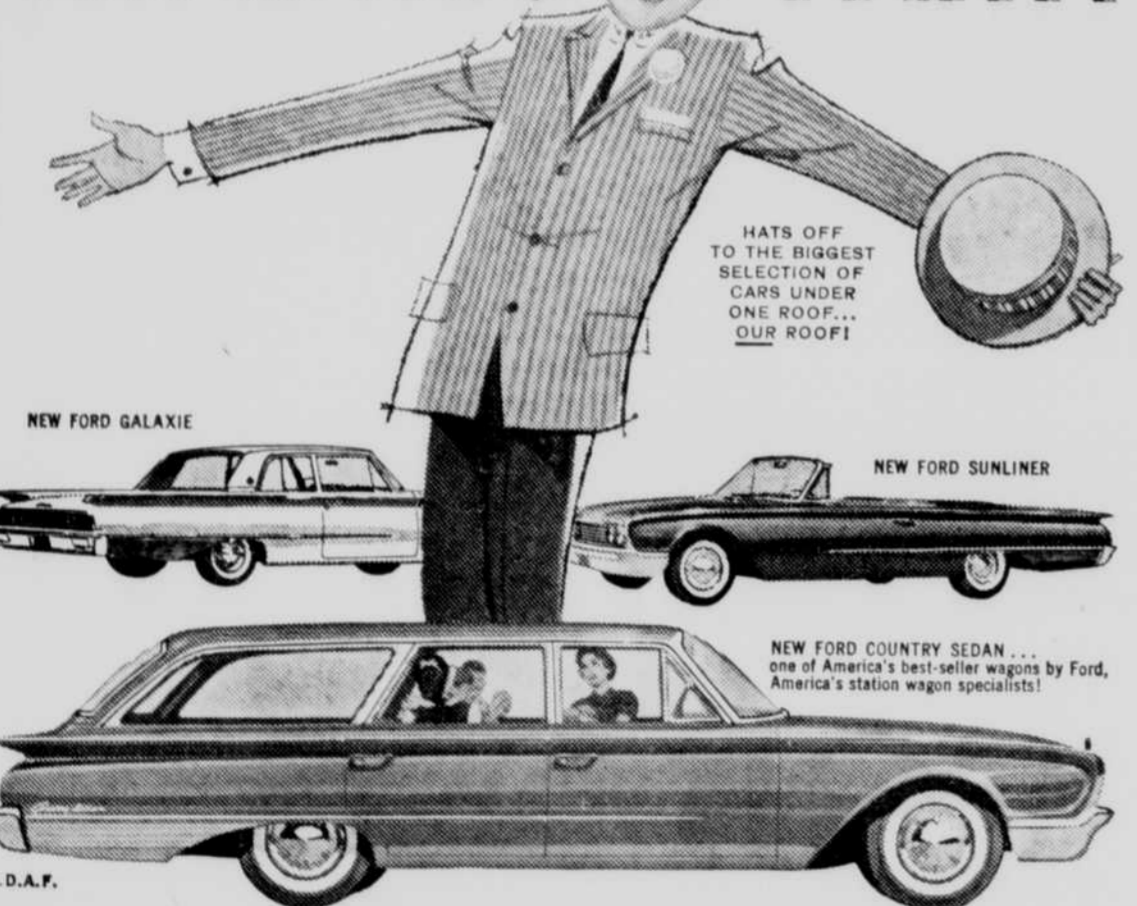
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
