#### DEAR EDITOR

It is a forgone conclusion that many hardships and difficulties will be encountered. These can only be corrected by the entire community supporting the new school bond issue. The accreditation of the school is also in jeopardy. If this situation is not cleared up by a new school building facilities, and the school be taken off the approval list and thereby not qualified for free

high school tuition or state apportionment, the district would stand to lose in the neighborhood of \$35000 that it now receives from free high school tuition and state apportionment. This is much more than it will cost to liquidate the bond required for the new school. The architect has not come up with an exact figure for the bond election, but this will be out in the very near future. The exact time for the election has not been set and neither has it been established whether it will be a general or special election.

As soon as definite decisions are reached publication will be made. A number of people have been commenting that the half sessions are not necessary. Presently we have 14 elementary oroms and 17 teachers. All teachers will have from 22-30 students in each section, these will vary. The crowded conditions are not a temporary thing and will get progressively worse.

If we count only our fifth, sixth, seventh, and eighth grade stu-dents that we had last year: fifth -52, sixth -47, seventh -42, eighth -50, we will have 186 students in high school in 1965 not counting any students from the country for free high school. For years we have been receiving between 15 and 20 each year or an average of somewhere around 60 F.H.S. 


