Need a Dog? See B. Everett At Atkinson

In Atkinson if you "want a man about a dog" and ask for B. Everett, you're in for a surprise. It's a pleasant surprise however and after you get over the shock of finding the dog rancher wears dresses and has a Mrs. hooked on in front of her name, you'll find B. Everett knows hunting dogs from Cocker Spaniels to Weimaraners. She raises them too.

In 1925, she and her husband, the former Harley Everett,

started raising dogs as a side line to ranching. "We had two registered dogs at the time," says Mrs. Everett. "An Irish and an English Setter." By slow degrees they added more and different breeds of dogs until they were devoting most of their time to dog raising instead of the cultivation of oats and corn.

On the ranch located about five miles east of Atkinson Bea and her son Roland have a dog collection that make sportsmen everywhere drool with envy. Weimaraners lift strange pale colored eyes when you near their pens. Irish Setters move with red grace. Golden Retrievers, Labradors, German Short Hairs and English Setters warily watch your approach. These dogs are not pets. They are working dogs

and it is best not to form a close attachment to anyone except the owner. Eleven different breeds of sporting dogs are represented here.

"We have shipped dogs," Mrs. Everett says. "To every state in the union including Hawaii. Our dogs have gone to Porto Rico, Italy and England." Thousands of dogs, she estimated, have been sold over the years. The highest priced dog on the ranch was a \$750 English Setter. Dogs are purchased from kennels all over the states.

A brooder house is maintained for the puppies in cold damp weather. When young they are most susceptible to disease. The ideal time to sell is at seven weeks when they have learned to eat and are weaned from the mother.

"We hear from people from all over," says Mrs. Everett. "About dogs they have brought from us. Sometimes they lose one and want a replacement exactly like it." One man was so entranced with the animal he bought that he wrote a small book about it and sent them a copy. Another man wrote angrily that after trying out the dog it had proved gun shy and threatened suit. When the Everetts wrote back saying their dogs were guaranteed and his money would be refunded, they received an apologetic letter saying the owner would not dream of parting with the dog, it had become one of the family.

Which dogs are Mrs. Everett's favorites? "Irish Setters. They have style, beauty and brains." Which type does she have for a house pet? "A 12 year old Dachshund named Duchess."
