



Shorthorns Are Part of Their Life

"My father homesteaded this land for grazing stock in the 1880s," said Mrs. Tom Baker. "He brought in his herd of registered Short Horn cattle then. That breed of cattle have been a part of the place ever since."

Mr. and Mrs. Tom Baker live on what is known throughout the county as the old Riley Ranch. On this place located about 25 miles south of Atkinson the Baker's live in semi-retirement. Due to ill health of the owners (Ruth and Tom) as they are affectionately known to the community) the famous herd has had to be curtailed. But though it has lessened in quantity it still carries the blood lines of its famous forbears.

"I have loved cattle all my life," says Ruth as she moves deftly about in her wheel chair hunting out records of the cattle. She comes up with a picture of Judge's Heiress. A Short Horn cow purchased in Canada by her father when she was a small girl.

"This cow won firsts every place she was shown. Many of our herd can be traced back to her." Probably Ruth's deep interest in cattle can be traced back to when she was a child. She was one of the first children in the state to belong to a 4-H club.

Tom's interest in live stock was acquired when he came to the States from South Somerset, England as a lad of 17. He came via Canada and began working for the Riley's at their place in Boone county. In 1913 he came to Holt County where he has remained since. Ruth did not leave her Boone County home to live on the ranch until 1925. Romance flowered and the ranch in Holt County became their home.

Though work is carried on in the modern day manner at the present time, Tom remembers vividly the impact the strange new country had for a young Englishman. The barb wire telephone was perhaps the strangest innovation. The top wire of the fence insulated from the posts by bits of old overshoe served as the news carrying medium. "We had to fence ride the phone line then," he says.

The kitchen addition to the ranch house is interesting. The building, before being hauled to its present location many years ago, was the printing shop of the Amelia Journal, a weekly newspaper that flourished around 1890. The walls beneath their present modish wall paper covering are decorated with pages of the long extinct publication.

"People urge us to sell the place and retire," say the Bakers. But we like it here and the cattle are a part of our lives." We agreed their decision was a wise one. Changing locations would only be changing one set of known values for another of untested quality.
