Eagles Cinch Eastern Division Honors in Rangeland Conference

The O'Neill High Eagles wrapped up the championship of the eastern division of the Rangeland conference Friday night by defeating Ainsworth 35-6.

It was the 15th win in a row for Coach Jake Hawley's Eagles and they have yet to face defeat.

For the first time this year OHS lost the toss and were forced to kick to start the game. Ainsworth picked up a first down on a quick pass from Hamilton to McNally. But from the Eagle defense tightened and the Ainsworth boys were forced to punt.

Five plays later the Eagles had their first touchdown, highlighted by a 16 yard run by Kilcoin and a 12 yard run by Curt Larson. Terry Kurtz threw the scoring pass to Kilcoin from 40 yards out to top the seventy yard drive. Jack McGinn scored the extra point and the Eagles led 7-0.

The Bulldogs picked up 2 first downs before they lost the ball on a fumble recovered by Gary Plesel. O'Neill then drove from their own 31 yard line to the AHS 20 yard line before they fumbled and Stan Lehn recovered the loose ball for Ainsworth.

The Bulldogs were unable to drive and punted to Jerry Kilcoin standing on his own 45 and behind good blocking he twisted and turned and scored OHS's second TD of the evening. McGinn once again pushed over the extra point and the Eagles led 14-0.

Steve Peterson recovered a loose ball to halt Ainsworth once again. The Eagles moved down to the ten yard line and on a fourth and eight Kurtz elected to try for the TD and his attempted pass to Stan Schmiechel was incomplete and the Bulldogs took over.

The Academy Cardinals used a bruising ground game Friday evening at Ewing to grind out their fourth victory of the year, 34-0.

The Ewing Tigers showed fine defensive strength throughout the contest but were unable to move the ball against the strong Academy forward wall.

The Cards, attempting to hit paydirt, quickly opened up with an air attack but Spitzberger having a bad night was unable to find his receivers. Donohoe again took a pass from Spitzberger to make the count 27-0.

Belina rested very little before his next TD jump as two plays later he picked a Ewing pass out of the air and raced 40 yards to end the scoring. Gene Shoemaker's fine defensive end play highlighted the forward wall while Terry Tomjack, making his first appearance as linebacker, gave valuable help to the secondary, along with the usual good defensive play of Tom Wanser and Jim Sullivan, as they limited the Tigers to but four completions in 19 attempts for a total of 25 yds.

Underclassmen Dick Larson, Mike Hammond and Jerry Donohoe performed well throughout the contest.
