Cards Finish with 6-1-1 Record; **Outscore Opponents 215 to 49**

St. Mary's Cardinals finished the season with six wins, one loss and one tie - making the Cards third season of 11-man football with a total of 18 wins, 5 defeats and 1 tie.

The '61 Cardinals completely dominated the statistics in every department as they outscored their oppents 215 to 49. Other statistics:


