Orchard Man Dies Nov. 13 At His Home

ORCHARD — Maurice Carter, Orchard's oldest resident, died at his home in Orchard Monday, Nov. 13, at the age of 92 years. Funeral services were conducted at the Hamilton mortuary here Thursday. Burial was in the Orchard cemetery. The Rev. D. Lenz was in charge of services.

Maurice Carter was born near Meets, Ia., April 14, 1866, and grew to manhood there. In the spring of 1888 he moved to Hay Springs where he was married to Margaret E. Lautenschlager. The couple moved to Orchard in 1902 and they resided on a farm northeast of Orchard until 1909 when they purchased a home in Orchard. Mrs. Carter preceded him in death in December, 1906.

Funeral services were held at the home of Mrs. Carter, 1401 S. 1st St., at 10:30 a. m. on Monday, Nov. 13. Burial was in the Orchard cemetery. The Rev. D. Lenz was in charge of services.

Services Held At Atkinson for T. J. Flannery

ATKINSON — The body of Thomas J. Flannery, 50, farmer and lifelong resident of the Atkinson community, was discovered Wednesday morning, Nov. 15, in a vacant house about a mile west of the Flannery farm.

Flannery had been missing since Monday afternoon. A search was started Tuesday and his body was found by his brother, John, and a neighbor.

According to Sheriff Leo Tomjack, cause of death was due to deadly gas which was apparently self-inflicted. A powder, containing cyanide, and used for rodent control had been dumped into a bucket of water found near the body.

Funeral services were held Friday morning at St. Joseph's cemetery. Military rites were conducted by Farley-Tushla Post of the American Legion.

Thomas J. Flannery was born February 12, 1911 at Atkinson to John J. and Catherine Jennings Flannery. He and his brother were active in the raising of meat-type hybrid hogs. Mr. Flannery was not married.

Survivors are his brother, John, and two sisters, Mrs. Frank Prussa and Mrs. Francis Torpy, all of Atkinson.

Funeral Rites Held Nov. 15 For H. Williby

ROYAL — Funeral services were conducted here Wednesday, Nov. 15, for Herbert C. Williby, 51, who died Monday, Nov. 13, at the Antelope Memorial hospital in Neligh.

He grew to manhood on a farm near Royal and attended school in the village, graduating with the class of 1930. He was married in 1940 to Ardith Mattison and two children were born to this couple. He was assessor in Verdigris township nine years and was a member of the board of education in Royal. He farmed until four years ago when he retired because of ill health.

Survivors are his wife, sons, Errol and Larry; his parents, Mr. and Mrs. William Williby, Blair; four sisters and three brothers, all of Blair.
