State High School Athletic Assn. **Issues Basketball Rule Changes**

Several changes in basketball rules have been issued by the National Federation of State High School Athletic associations for use by officials during 1961-62

Often times lack of understanding of the rules causes observers to disagree with officials' rulings and perhaps the printing of some of these changes will eliminate

these occurances. Following is a partial list of the current changes:

The court diagram now includes, on each side of the free throw lane, a neutral zone designated by marks of contrasting color to that of the bounding

The referee is required to "check and approve" the score at the end of each half rather than "carefully examine the scorebook and approve the score." This elimates a timeconsuming chore.

The official shall now hand (not toss) the ball to the player making the throw-in in specified situations

Substitutions may be made during the dead ball period caused by a violation. This will provide numerous additional opportunities for substituting.

The visiting team shall have its choice of baskets at which it may practice before the game and it shall use this basket during the first half.

The "sudden end" rule for deciding games tied at the end of the 4th quarter has been eliminated. Hereafter, if an overtime period ends in a tie, it will be followd by another threeminute overtime period. A winner will be determined when one team has a greater score than the other at the end of a period. It is now necessary for a jumper to have only one foot tounching or inside the jump

After a common foul committed by a player while he or a teammate is in control, any player of the offended team shall make the throw-in from out of bounds spot nearest the foul.

It is a free throw violation for any player to have either foot beyond the vertical plane of any edge of the space designated by a lane space mark or of a neutral zone mark before the ball touches the ring or backboard or until the free throw ends.

A provision now permits a coach or team follower to communicate with his players on the court, and may give instruitions to his players including the direction to call a time-out.

Any coach or team lonower who disrespectfully addresses an official or an opponent or whose actions are likely to cause a crowd to react in an undesirable or unfavorable manner is to be penalized immediately.


