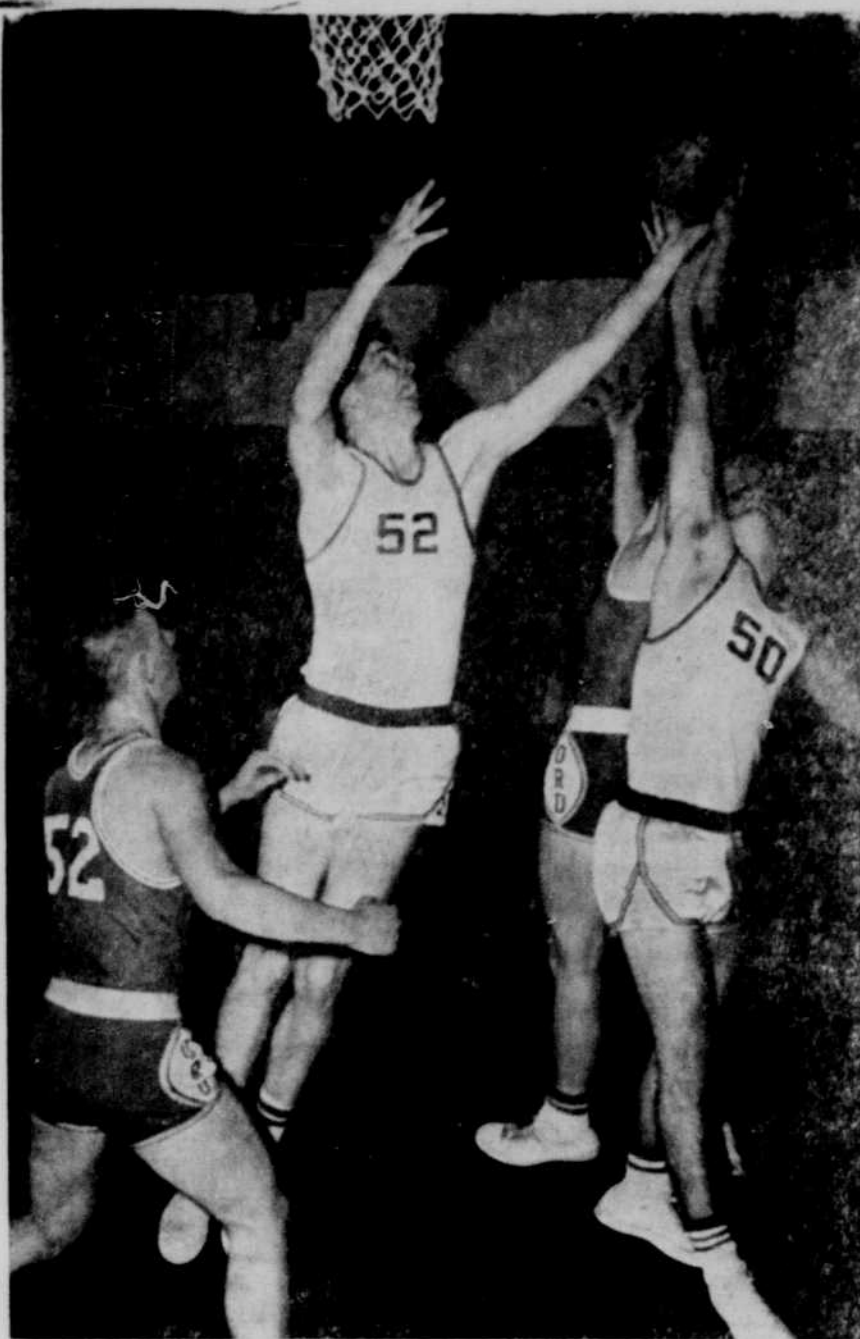


# Eagles Down Ainsworth And Ord; SMA Loses To Stuart

## Eagles Trim Chanticleers 43-36; Hill, Kilcoin Share Scoring Honor

The Ord Chanticleers came to town Tuesday night and suffered a 43-36 setback at the hands of a well balanced O'Neill cage team.

With neither team being able to get a sustained scoring break going O'Neill took a 9-4 first quarter lead behind the outside shooting of Terry Kurtz.

The Ord kept usually hot-shooting Rich Hill down to 3 points in the first half. Jerry Kilcoin with a 10 point second quarter showed the Eagles to a 13-point halftime advantage. Score at the end of the first half was 21-9.

The second half found the Ord team cutting down the O'Neill lead but Hill and Stan Schmeichel furnished the fireworks in this half to always keep the home team in front.

Hill finally found the shooting range and with Harve Colpack's rebounding help, the Eagles still held a comfortable margin, 30-21.

The third period was Ord's best though as Fox of Ord, who led both teams in scoring with 15 points, dumped in 10 of them in that quarter.

Play in the last period was spirited and the Ord cagers pressed hard but with Hill blocking Ord shots and with Schmeichel and Hill potting 11 points between them in that quarter the score ended at 43-36.

O'Neill was never threatened in the ballgame, taking an early lead on find outside shooting by Stan Schmeichel. Rich Hill gave the Ainsworth boys trouble all night with his great play under the basket.

Coach Chuck Smith's boys proved that they had a bright future in store by completely dominating the game. The Eagles hit 75 per cent of their free throws.

Hill hit 24 points to lead the local lads scoring and Schmeichel followed with 21 points. The rest of the pointers were divided between Terry Kurtz, Harvey Colpack and Jerry Kilcoin.

Kurtz and Kilcoin play very well defensively. Colpack gained many rebounds and scored two lay-ins right before the gun.

O'Neill high has three games this week. Ord played here Tuesday night and Atkinson will be here Friday night. Saturday the Eagles go to Bassett for a game.

## Schnabel Missing After Mishap on Lewis and Clark

CLEARWATER — Lawrence Schnabel, 47, disappeared in a boating accident while duck hunting Wednesday afternoon, Dec. 6, on Lewis and Clark Lake north of Santee.

Schnabel was hunting with Mr. and Mrs. Jeff Hienze, Randall and Jack Hixson, Bus Yaryan, Kenneth Twiss and Bill Snider. The two boats used were an island when the boat in which Schnabel, Hienze, Hixsons and Twiss were riding, dipped and started filling with water.

The second boat took aboard all the men except Ramell, who hung on the side, and Schnabel, who remained with the partially submerged boat. Those in the already overloaded boat called to him to hang on and that they would come back for him.

Their last glimpse of him was as he hung to the side of the boat which was drifting toward an island. The boat was later found in the middle of the lake but no discovery has been made of Schnabel despite a continued search.

High winds and waves hindered the search; Wednesday night, Alvin Tinsley and Harold Beringer, other hunters, were forced to spend the night on another island. They were rescued the following morning suffering little effect from the mishap.

Crandall Hopkins and Gib Geist, Niobrara, Walter and Gene Patras, Clearwater, attempted to rescue Tinsley and Beringer but were unable to reach the island and had to remain on the water all day.

Lawrence Schnabel, a life-time Clearwater and community resident, has two children, Dallas, a junior in high school, and Mrs. Arnold Oltjenbruns, Plainview. His wife is the former June Koehrs, Newman Grove. His sister, Mrs. John Schultz, and two brothers, Fred and Walter, also reside in Clearwater.

## Off-Campus Classes Considered Here

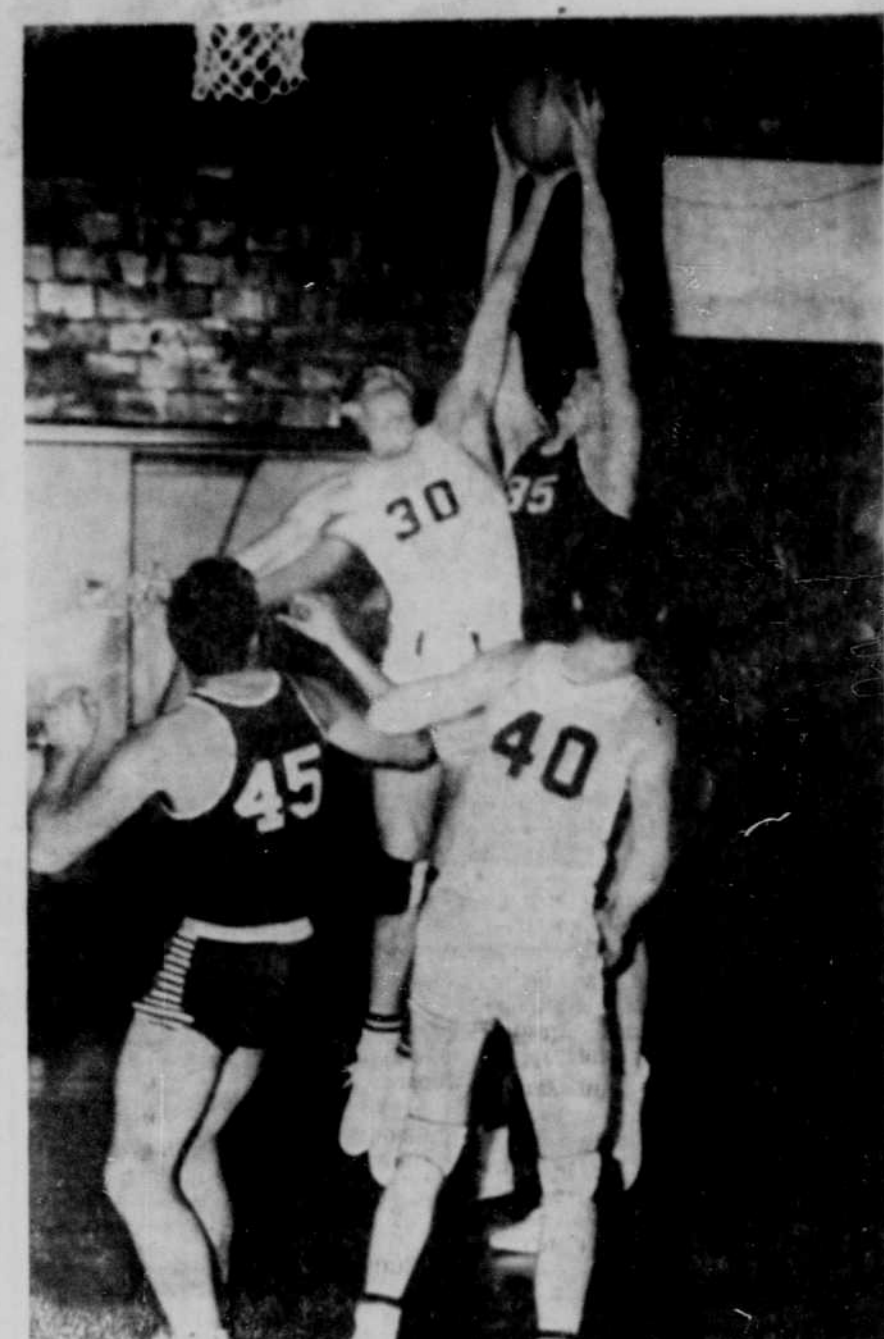
Two off-campus classes are being considered for the second semester, according to Miss Alice French, county superintendent.
