Eagles Stop Ainsworth; Fall 59-39 At Valentine

Playing on their home court for the first time in a month the Eagles downed Ainsworth for the second time this year 62-48. A standing room only crowd saw the eagles notch their seventh win of the season.

The Bulldogs used the full court press the entire game while this is the type of offense O'Neill enjoys having thrown at them missed many easy shots in the first half.

Halftime score found O'Neill trailing by four points. As the second half opened they showed no signs of fatigue as they poured in 24 points the third quarter and really got tough on defense holding Ainsworth to five points.

The second half of play saw the Eagles hitting 12 field goals to Ainsworth's four. The excellent shooting of Stan Schmeichel from both outside and inside earned him high point honors with 20. He also pulled down 13 rebounds. Rich Hill was top rebounder of the night with 18. Jerry Kilcoin was once again outstanding on defense and led the fast break.

The entire team played a top notch brand of basketball which has given them the reward of being rated the number one team in the state in this class.

The O'Neill Eagles traveled to Valentine Friday night to suffer their first defeat of the season 59-39. A large crowd of O'Neill fans saw a hot Valentine team halt the Eagles chances for an undefeated season.

The Nelson brothers were the big guns for Valentine as they tossed in 16 and 17 points each. The Nelson's also sported a 100 percent record from the free throw line.

Beside being cold from the outside O'Neill was hampered by the fact Rich Hill had injured his back several days before and was unable to rebound in his usual fashion.

The Eagles were able to score only 16 points the first half and

managed only 9 points in the third quarter while Valentine netted 16. The O'Neill five did outscore Valentine in the final stanza, 14-13.

Kilcoin was high point man for O'Neill with 14 and Hill was second with 13.

A capacity crowd was present Thursday evening for the fourth annual pre-Golden Gloves boxing contest at the O'Neill public school auditorium.

The main event was a match between Butch Pofahl, 158, Ewing and Keith Steffen, 154, Norfolk. Pofahl decisioned Steffen in this contest. Last year Steffen, as a welterweight, won in the Norfolk meet, a title he also won in 1956 before entering the service.

Two exhibition bouts were fought, the first one by 10-year-old Randy Curran and 9-year-old Tommie Pofahl who presented a two-round crowd pleaser. The second exhibition fight was between Bob Murphy, 156, and Gene Shoemaker, 165, which was declared a draw.

University Is Offering Eight Weeks Courses

The University of Nebraska is offering a special educational opportunity for out-of-school youth. It is called the Midwest Institute for Young Adults.
The institute lasts for eight weeks and consists of courses designed for self-improvement in business and in agriculture plus other courses to enhance the student's social and cultural understanding.
Although the courses do not provide academic credit toward a degree, they are at a post-high school level, and a certificate is awarded upon completion of the eight-week term.
The winter term begins February 5 and ends March 30, 1962. "Learn to Earn" courses offered for the term include the following: Small Business management, Principles of economics, Office Management and Procedures, Secretarial Training, Business and Public Speaking, Farm Records and Management, Field Crops, Insects Affecting Animals and Crops, Dairy Husbandry and Farm Machinery.
"Learn to Live" courses offered include: Consumer Problems, Reading for Enjoyment, Home Beautification and Recreational Leadership. Social and recreational activities are also a part of the program.
The cost of the eight-week term is \$250. This includes the course fee, room, meals and campus fees. Students will need additional funds for their books and other instructional materials and for personal items. Complete facilities are provided in the new Hall of Youth in the Nebraska Center.
Any young man or woman beyond high school age, regardless of rural or urban residence may apply for admission. More information may be obtained from the County Extension office in O'Neill.

Leland Timmerman led Verdigre with 22 points, followed by John Mastlar, 18, Allen Boelter and Dennis Mott, who each scored 16.

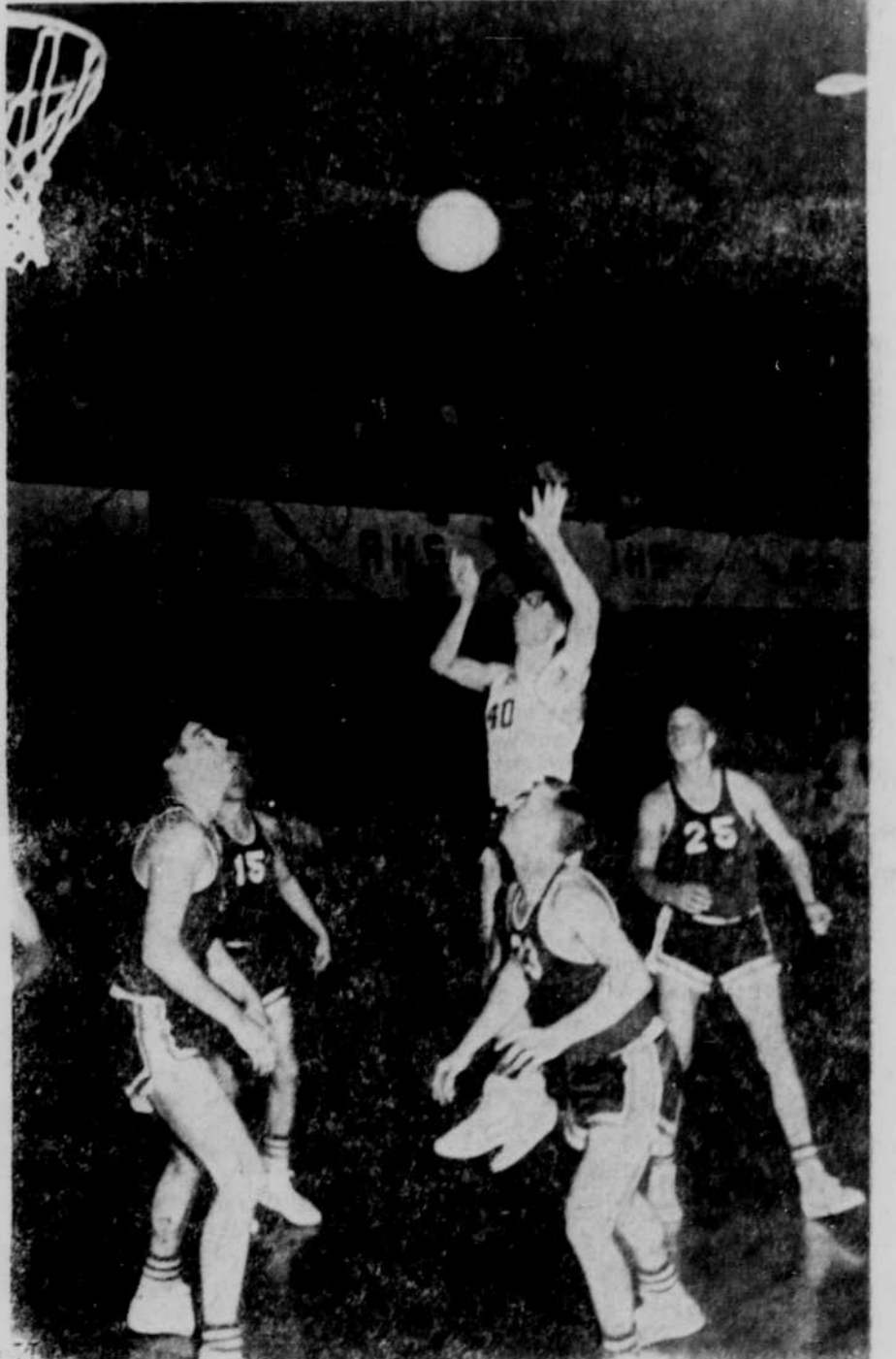
Jerry Closter was top scorer for St. Ludger with 30 points. Jerry Vogt had 22.
