Dedication Rites Held For School, Convent

One of the most important events in the history of the St. Patrick's parish in O'Neill was observed Wednesday afternoon when the official dedication of the new St. Mary's high school and convent was held.

Officiating at the rite was Archbishop Gerald T. Bergan. Dedication of the two buildings marks the culmination of a vast

building and improvement program undertaken by the parish. Total cost of the program is in excess of one half million dollars. Rt. Rev. Msgr. Timothy O'Sullivan is pastor of St. Patrick's parish, and Rev. Father Robert Duffy is assistant pastor.

Following the blessing of the school and convent at 4 p.m. by Archbishop Bergan and the priests the procession returned to the church for Solemn Benediction and a sermon by Father Francis Price.

A dedication banquet was held in the new parish hall at 6 p.m. Openhouse for the school will be held at a later date.


