Commencement exercises of the Chambers high school will be Friday evening, May 18 and baccalaureate services Sunday evening, May 13 at the school auditorium.

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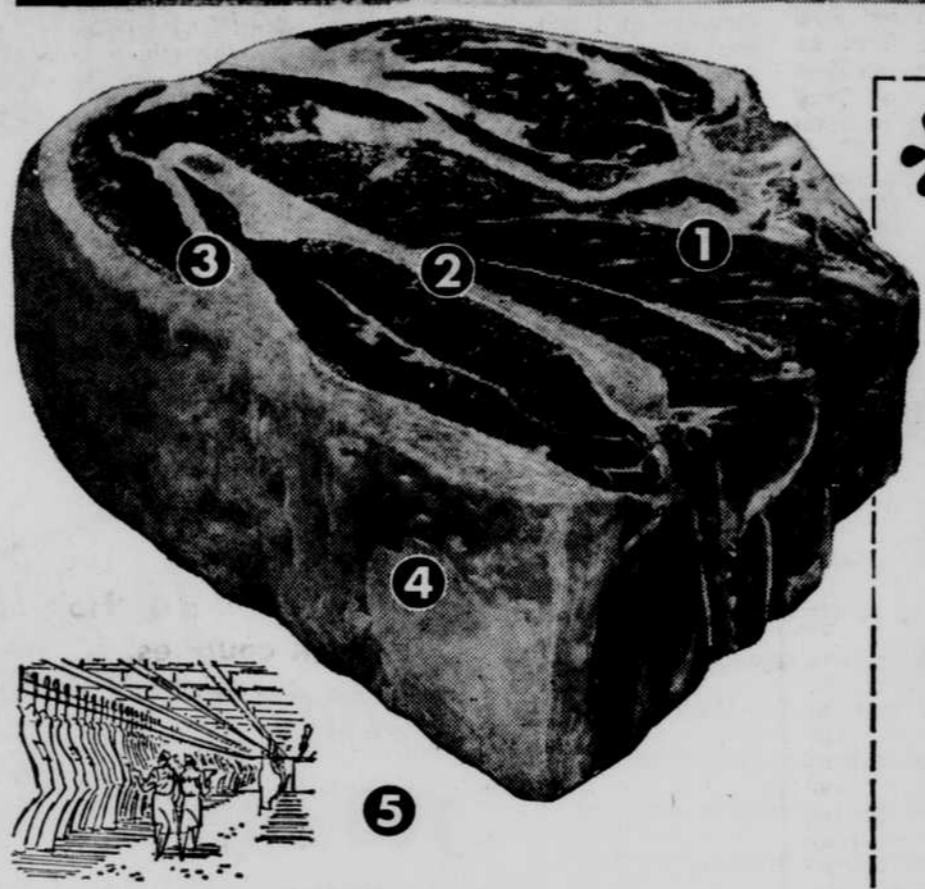
