Report from Washington

Even if every one of Billy Sol Estes' transactions had been strictly honest, his career would still provide damaging evidence against the Government's farm programs.

It shows dramatically how they have worked to the advantage of wealthy, big-time operators who don't need public assistance and who, in all too many cases, got into the business of farming — or storing of farm products — simply to make money at the expense of the Government. Meanwhile, millions of small farmers, whom the various programs were supposed to be protecting against their big competitors and against fluctuations in the market price of their produce, have given up their farms and have taken city jobs.

The storage program was intended to be an "on the farm" program, yet operators like Estes have been able to use their influence and have diverted grain from "on the farm" storage to Texas. It appears that Nebraska farmers have suffered from this. This program has simply gotten too big for the good of the farmer and the country.

One interesting development — what happened, and who received \$145,000 in cash which Estes withdrew from the bank just before one of his trips to Washington? A complete airing of this entire mess must be made and those involved must be exposed and punished, regardless of who they are.

In an era where love of country and devotion to country are derided by liberals, both cynical and fuzzy-minded, the words "duty, honor, and country" stand in need of fresh assertion. General MacArthur, speaking to the cadets at West Point on May 12th said: "Duty, honor, country: Those three hallowed words reverently dictate what you want to be, what you can be, what you will be. The unbelievers will say they are but words, but a slogan, but a flamboyant phrase. Every pedant, every demagogue, every cynic, every hypocrite, every troublemaker, and, I am sorry to say, some others of an entirely different character, will try to downgrade them to the extent of mockery and ridicule." This recalls to mind the words of Colonel Glenn when he said that we should all be thrilled when the American flag goes by and feel something deep down inside of ourselves.

The Ways & Means Committee has reported out the President's legislation to give the President

the power to reduce tariffs on goods imported into this country. This bill is scheduled to come before us on the Floor of the House for debate during the week of June 18. This legislation is most far reaching and would cause abrupt changes in the economic life of our country. It gives the President broad powers to regulate tariffs.
