
"Passing Years Changes"

1880 The Frontier got going in a little building on South Fourth street, W. D. Mathews editor and publisher, Ezra Saunders, my brother, printer and

print shop boss. The building now stands where the post office and Frontier once were, with the Odd Fellows hall in the upper story. For some years The Frontier force got out their newspaper and commercial printing in the Millard building that was at Fifth and Douglas where today is a modern food store in a stately building. About 1899 The Frontier returned to its old home on South Fourth



street, and now waves its banner a block to the north. The First National bank and the old Commercial hotel are still where they got going in the early 1880's.

Had a West End for some of the cowboys and an East End for others. And the A-T had much of Wheeler county sod lands to graze their herds on, but Prairieland Talker just north of the West End had about four sections of grass robed prairie to run cattle on for a time, West End and Circle S dropping out of the picture down there the same year.

I heard it just once today, the railroad engine whistle. But there was the roar of a number of airplanes flying by above, and countless cars and trucks rushed by my door. On the go, yes that's paper is a member of the Nebraska Press Assoit today as it has ever been since the days we made
