The work of burying the new long distance cable between Norfolk and O'Neill will begin next week, according to C. R. Alexander, Northwestern Bell manager. The cable, which was manufactured at Millard, Nebr., has already been delivered to the site.

The service is presently being provided by 75 miles of open wire line strung on telephone poles which will be removed.

Alexander said, "The new buried cable will make the long distance circuits between Norfolk and O'Neill virtually storm-proof and will provide additional circuits to meet the increasing demand for the service in future years. This is part of a continuing statewide program to give us nearly trouble-free service as possible and eliminate interruptions due to storm damage.

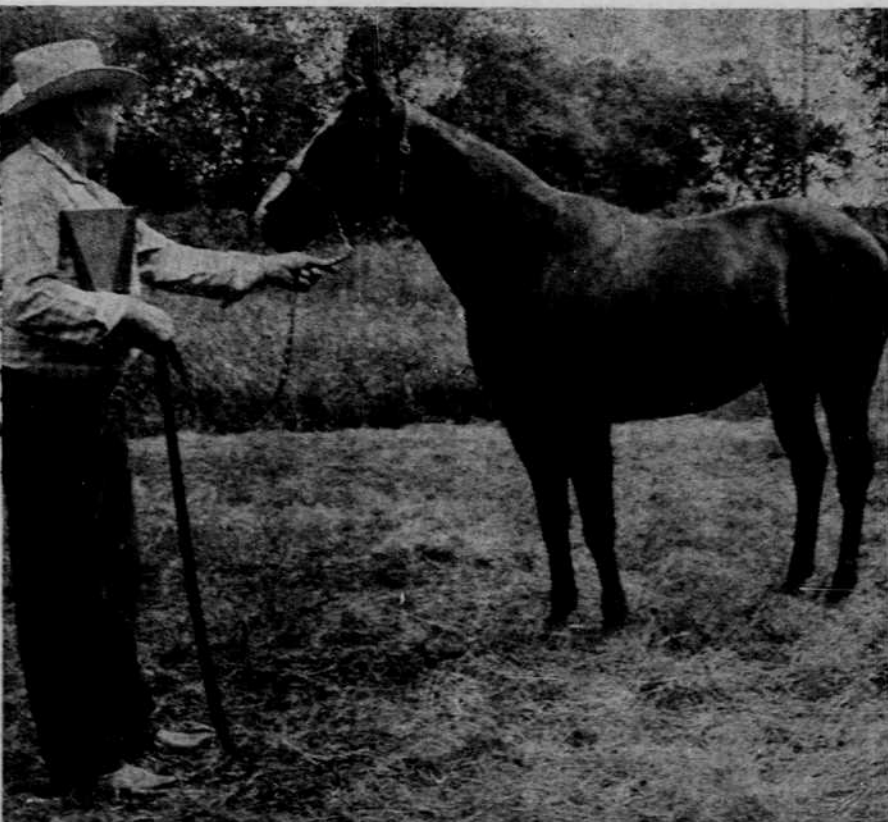

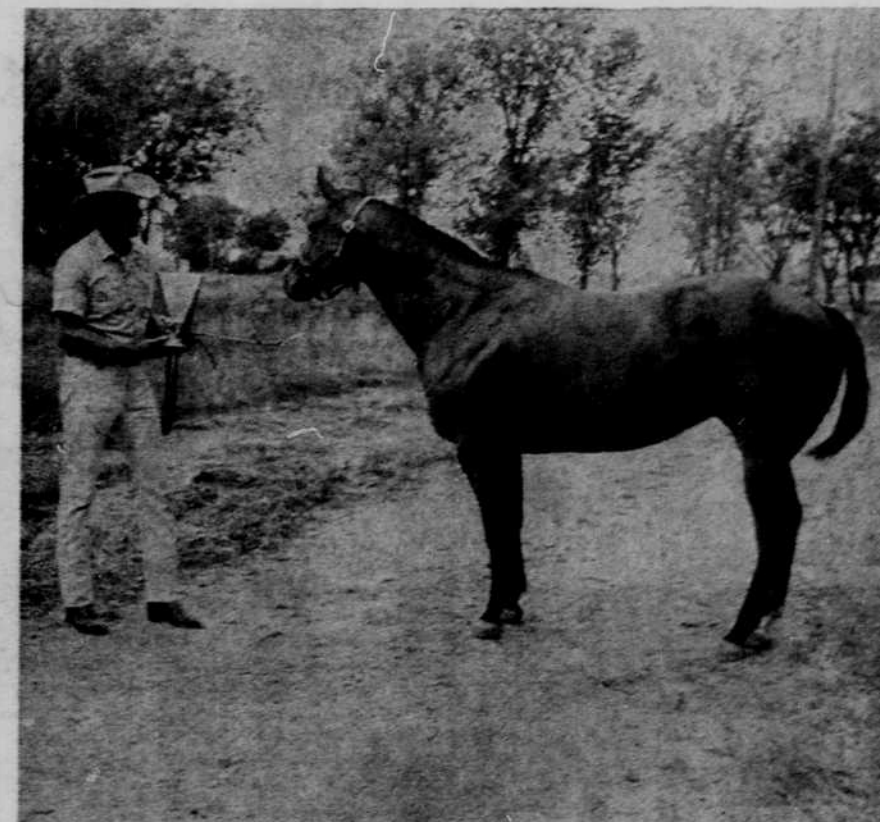

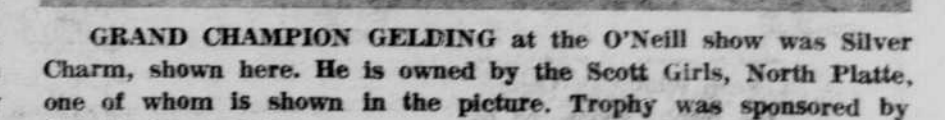

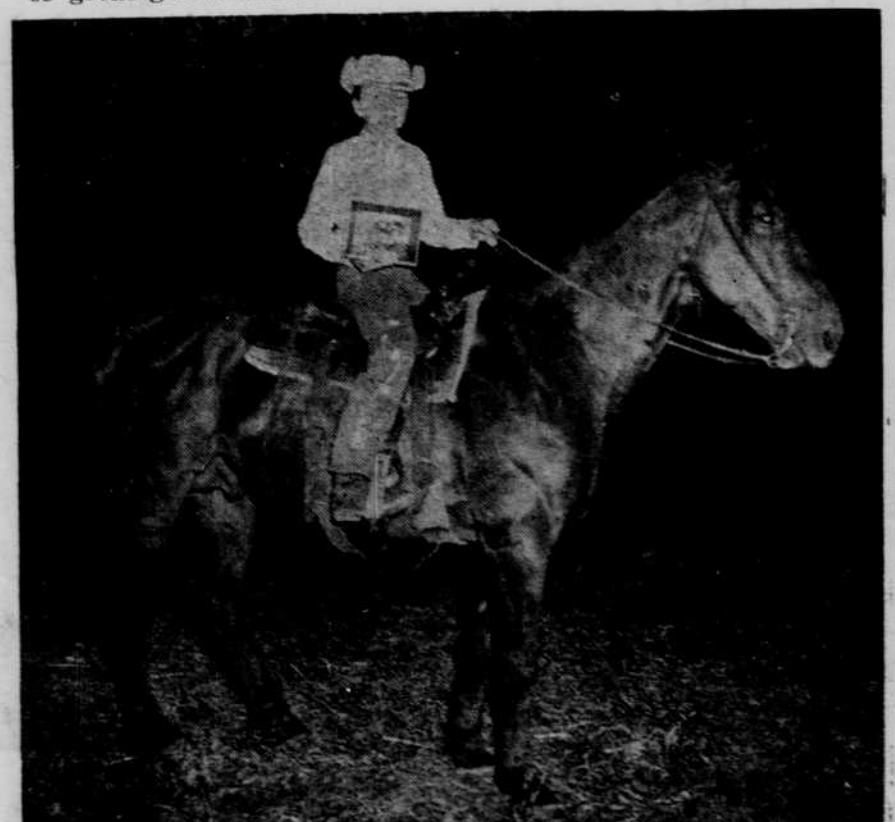
