They had nine children. Their married life was spent in the vicinity of Orchard and Royal where they had recently established their home. The older children have a paper route. Mrs. Waterman was received into membership in St. Peter's English Lutheran church at Orchard April 21, 1949, by Holy Baptism, and on that day was confirmed. Mrs. Waterman was preceded in death by her father and one brother. Surviving relatives next of kin include her husband and eight children, George, Martin, Lois, August, Robert, Mildred, Willie and Herman; her mother and step-father; three sisters, two brothers, a half-sister, and other relatives, as well as a host of friends.
