Coach Jim Taylor's high flying O'Neill Eagles tapped Creighton for their second victory of the season in a game played Friday evening in O'Neill. A good turnout of local fans and Creighton boosters watched O'Neill Power Pony Steve Peterson and half-back Rich Frost lead the Eagles to a 21-6 decision.

Fullback Peterson averaged five yards for 14 carries including a three-yard TD jaunt in the third quarter. Flashy Frost swept for the first touchdown from six yards out after intercepting an enemy pass in the first quarter, and then he cradled in a 22-yard scoring pass from Terry Kurtz in the second quarter that gave the local eleven a 14-0 edge at half-time.

Left-halfback Larry Leib, 140-pound junior, led the Eagle backs with an average of nine yards per carry, including a 45-yard run that helped set up the second touchdown. Senior Ron Kallhoff carried the pigskin 35 yards into Creighton territory in the final quarter only to have the play called back due to one of the numerous penalties that halted the Eagles' second-half drive.

The Eagles lost the toss and kicked to a fired up Creighton team, but Frost's interception of a Lee George aerial halted the initial drive and set up O'Neill's first tally. Peterson led this series with a run of 18 yards to set Frost up for his six-yard score.

A pass from Kurtz to Rich Hill was good for the extra point and O'Neill led 7-0 when the first quarter ended.

In the second quarter O'Neill was struck by penalties the second time they had the ball. But with third down and some twenty yards to go at midfield, Leib took a double hand-off from Frost and scampered 45 yards deep into Creighton territory. Another penalty placed O'Neill with a first and ten on the 22 when Kurtz dropped back and tossed a TD pass that Frost grabbed while crossing the goal line. Peterson obliged with the extra point and the Eagles held a 14-0 advantage at half-time.

The home eleven received the second half kickoff and marched to their third touchdown with Peterson carrying over from the three. Big Ivan Hurley handled a Kurtz pass to account for the extra point and Creighton trailed 21-0 at the end of three quarters.

With the start of the fourth quarter the O'Neill eleven took a rest, both on the field and off. The second team held their own against the Creighton starters, but the visitors took advantage of a sluffing first-team line and blocked a Kurtz punt on the five-yard marker. On the next play 170-pound halfback Herb Saloum smashed up the middle for the touchdown, but the kicking attempt for the extra point was blocked by charging end Rich Hill.

Senior end Gary Plessell showed up good both on offense and defense. The Eagle's defensive line was led by Kallhoff, Keith Krugman and Peterson. Ends Hurley, Hill and Plessell caught two passes each and Frost's TD reception gave O'Neill passer Terry Kurtz a total of 61 yards in the air. The Eagles gained 204 yards on the ground.

Defensive play of Mudloff, Owen Donohoe, Mike Hammond and Bruce Appleby paced the Cardinal's defense, while running and passing of Donohoe added some spark to the sputtering Cards offense. The forward job of giving the quarterback time to pass but the receivers were having trouble hanging on to the ball.
