Vote "For "Nebraska

Walk into the ballot booth and place an "X" in front of the word "For" on Amendment No. 7, the bottom amendment on the ballot.

Why is this so important? You are voting "For" fair and just representation in the Nebraska State Legislature.

In Nebraska, through lawsuits and court actions, the AFL-CIO tried to keep you from voting this question. These labor groups did not want to let Nebraskans choose how to reapportion their own legislature.


The union is against any representation by area. They feel all representation should be on a population basis to favor the big metropolis.




