During the community meeting which I attended at Inman, I tried to call the community's attention to the unfavorable image of their community which was being created throughout the state by the unpleasant school situation at that time. My comment was that the "Inman School situation had resulted in much unfavorable publicity for their community.

I am sure that I did not say that the situation could be blam ed on unfavorable publicity as you quote me as having said in your editorial. Such a statement certainly would not have been consistent with the idea which was attempting to develop.

The problems of education need much more publicity than the newspapers in the State of Ne braska have been giving them in the past. All conscientious people who are vitally interested in developing better schools for our Nebraska boys and girls should Fri.-Sat. welcome any attempt on the part of the press to tell a true and accurate story of the shortcom? ings which are found in some schools. This, we feel that you did in your reporting of the school problem at Inman and rather than in any way condemning you for this publicity, we want to thank you sincerely for

it. We hope that you will continue to point up the school problems in Netraska so that people can be made aware of the seriousness of many of them.

I hope that you will use the columns of your editorial page to clear up any misunderstanding which might have come about as a result of your editorial. This I am sure, that in the interests of honest journalism, you will want
