Mr. and Mrs. Tenus Madsen and Neal were Sunday afternoon and supper guests with the Lewis Burgett family.

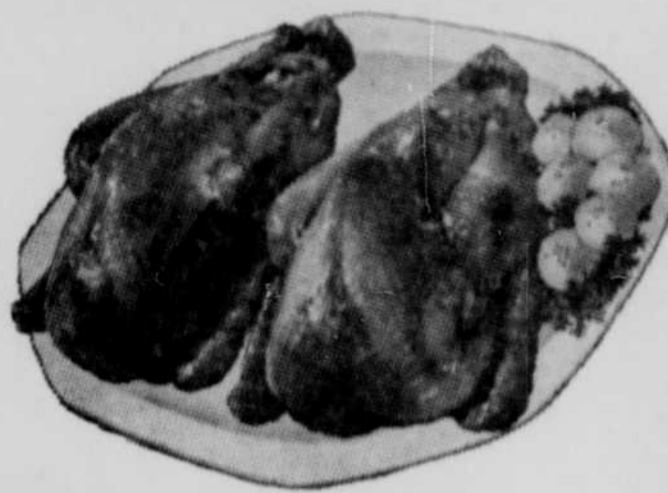

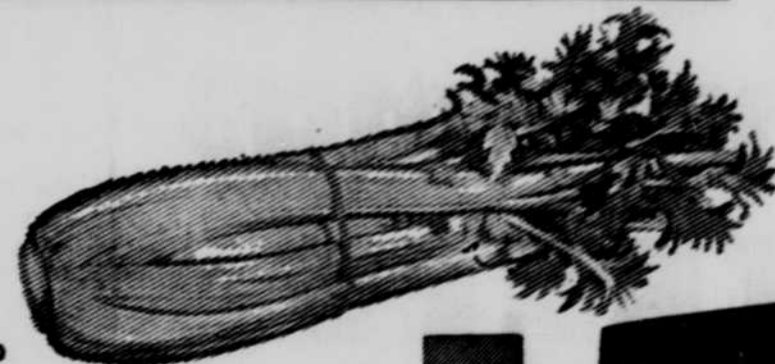
