- Instructions for licensing motor vehicles:
1. Return all copies of tax statements.
 2. Include 1962 registration certificate at time of licensing. \$1.00 extra fee must be charged if the old certificate is not presented at license time.
 3. Make check or money order for amount of tax and license fees.
 4. No new plates for 1963 so add only 5c for postage. For new registrations which require new 1962 plates to be mailed add 25c. There will be three different color stickers for validating 1962 plates for 1963.
- Red: Passenger cars and taxi.
Blue: Commercial trucks and interstate buses.
Yellow: Farm trucks, trailers, motorcycles, dealers and all others.

Honey-Mustard Glazed Leg 'O Lamb Recipe

1 5-lb. Leg 'O Lamb 1 tsp. salt
1/2 cup prepared mustard 1/4 tsp. pepper
1/2 cup honey

Place lamb on rack in shallow roasting pan. Bake in slow oven (300°) for 2 hours. Combine remaining ingredients. Pour over lamb. Bake 1/2 hour, or until meat thermometer registers 175-180 (depending upon desired degree of doneness). Serve with scalloped potatoes or buttered hominy, fresh spinach and head lettuce wedge salad. Always place the fat side upon rack in open roasting pan. Add no water, do not cover, do not baste. Serves 6.
