Kearney State To Offer Courses In Journalism

High school graduates interested in preparing for community newspaperwork have a new opportunity to them. They now can major in journalism at Nebraska State Teachers College at

The new program, effective next September, will offer students courses that will help them get jobs on weeklies and dailies

Students will be able to take as many as 19 courses in basic newspaper operations such as reporting, photography, editing, advertising, feature writing, printing and legal aspects affecting the press. Previously only a minor was offered.

This study program also will enable students to prepare as advisers of high school newspapers and yearbooks.

Teaching many of the courses will be Walter Stewart, former newsman-printer and publisher of the Farmington, Mo., Press who is introducing the new sequence of courses. Others who will teach parttime in the Journalism Department will be Don Briggs, NSTC public relations director; Eugene Buck, who will handle the printing courses: and Robert Larson, who will instruct a basic radio-television course.

Arrangements are being worked out to have Nebraska newspapermen help instruct in reporting, advertising, editing, and community newspaper courses.
