

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#### Report from Washington By Congressman Dave Martin Fourth District, Nebraska

Civilian employment reported by the executive agencies of the Federal Government as of January, 1963, totalled 2,477,937. This payroll for the last six months of 1962 amounted to \$7.6 billion, or a little over \$1.3 billion per month. This is exclusive of the military. . .a pretty good sized payroll to meet each month.

We are having a considerable volume of mail from farmers regarding corn stored on their farms, who are concerned about the rumor that the Government is going to call in the 1958-1959-1960 and 1961 corn. There are 25.5 million bushels of 1959 corn stored on Nebraska farms - 74 million bushels in the United States. In Nebraska there are 55 million bushels of the 1960 crop sealed in storage on Nebraska farms, and the total for the United States is 154 million bushels. There are 36 million bushels of corn on Nebraska farms of the 1961 crop, out of a total of 136 million bushels in the United States. All of the above figures concern only storage on the farm. They do not cover corn in commercial storage. I have written to the Secretary of Agriculture, Freeman, in regard to this

I mentioned last week that I had introduced legislation to increase the duty on meat imported into the United States to a 25% ad valorem rate. Importers of beef pay only 3c a pound duty. The figures of 1962 imports of dressed meat into this country have just been released. . .1,700, 000,000 pounds. I am told that to feed the animals necessary to produce this amount of meat would have taken 500,000 bushels of corn. Thus, we not only lost the profit on the production and the feeding of these animals, but also a substantial amount of corn. Our cattle industry does not want government controls and I agree with them on this stand. In addition, I feel they are entitled to some protection from prodhction from foreign

A pamphlet just published by the Agriculture Department, entitled, "Vertical Coordination in Agridulture" (Agricultural Economic Report No. 19) suggests that the cattle industry is ripe for more centralized control. The study suggests "startling changes" ahead with more profession-al management of volume, price and quality. The Report indicates more farmers and Co-ops will "intergrate" into processing and marketing, along with more nonfarm businesses having livestock raised under contract.


