Building problems occupied members of the O'Neill city council Tuesday night as they granted five building permits for homes, two for garages and one for a filling station.

Applicants for the home building permits were Ware Construction company, three homes; and Leslie Repenning and Cleveland Construction company, one each. Leonard Olberding and Richard Hovey applied for the garage

Apco Oil Co. was granted the application for a service station at the corner of First and Douglas streets.

In other business the council approved opening Eighth and Ninth streets from Adams north to the county road and opening Williams and John streets between Seventh and Ninth streets. Also approved was straightening of the county road along the north edge of town adjacent to the old fairground site.

Bids will be opened May 27 on sewer and water districts. A notice to bidders is published in this issue of the Frontier.
