(Published June 6, 1963) CITY OF O'NEILL, NEBRASKA ORDINANCE NO. 357-A AN ORDINANCE CREATING PAVING DISTRICT NUMBER 57 IN THE CITY OF O'NEILL, NEBRASKA, DEFINING THE BOUNDARIES AND PROVIDING FOR THE CONSTRUCTION OF STREET IMPROVEMENTS THEREIN.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE MAYOR AND CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF O'NEILL, NEBRASKA: Section 1. (a) There is hereby created within said City PAVING DISTRICT NUMBER 57 which shall include all the area within the following outer boundaries, to-wit:

Commencing at the midpoint on the north side of Block 13 of Hazlett's Addition to the City of O'Neill, Nebraska; thence east to the midpoint on the north side of Block 17 of Hazlett's Addition; thence north to the midpoint on the south side of Block 31 of the Original Town of O'Neill; thence west to the northwest corner of Lot 13 Block 43 of Rigg's Addition; thence south to the midpoint on the north side of Block 3 of Hazlett's Addition; thence south to the point of beginning.

(b) The following street in said District shall be improved by the construction of paving and such other work that may be incidental thereto: FIRST STREET from the south line of Hancock to the north line of Grant.

Section 2. The cost of said improvements in said District, excepting the street and alley intersections, shall be assessed against the property in said District specially benefited thereby as provided by law.
