BRISTOW- Donald Papstein, 26, former service man and a bachelor, who began farming for himself here this year, was found dead Monday at his home.

He had apparently been dead several days, but there was no evidence of foul play or suicide, according to Sheriff Claude Col-lins of Butte and Dr. R. E. Kriz of Lynch. Doctor Kriz said the young man apparently died of an internal hemorrhage.

Discovery of Papstein's body was made by his brother, Walter, and Reuben Avoy of Spencer, who went to the farm, 41/2 miles northeast of Spencer, early Monday morning.
