Mrs. Anna Carter was sponsor for the junior class and was in charge of the arrangements for the banquet. She was assisted with the preparation by the junior mothers.

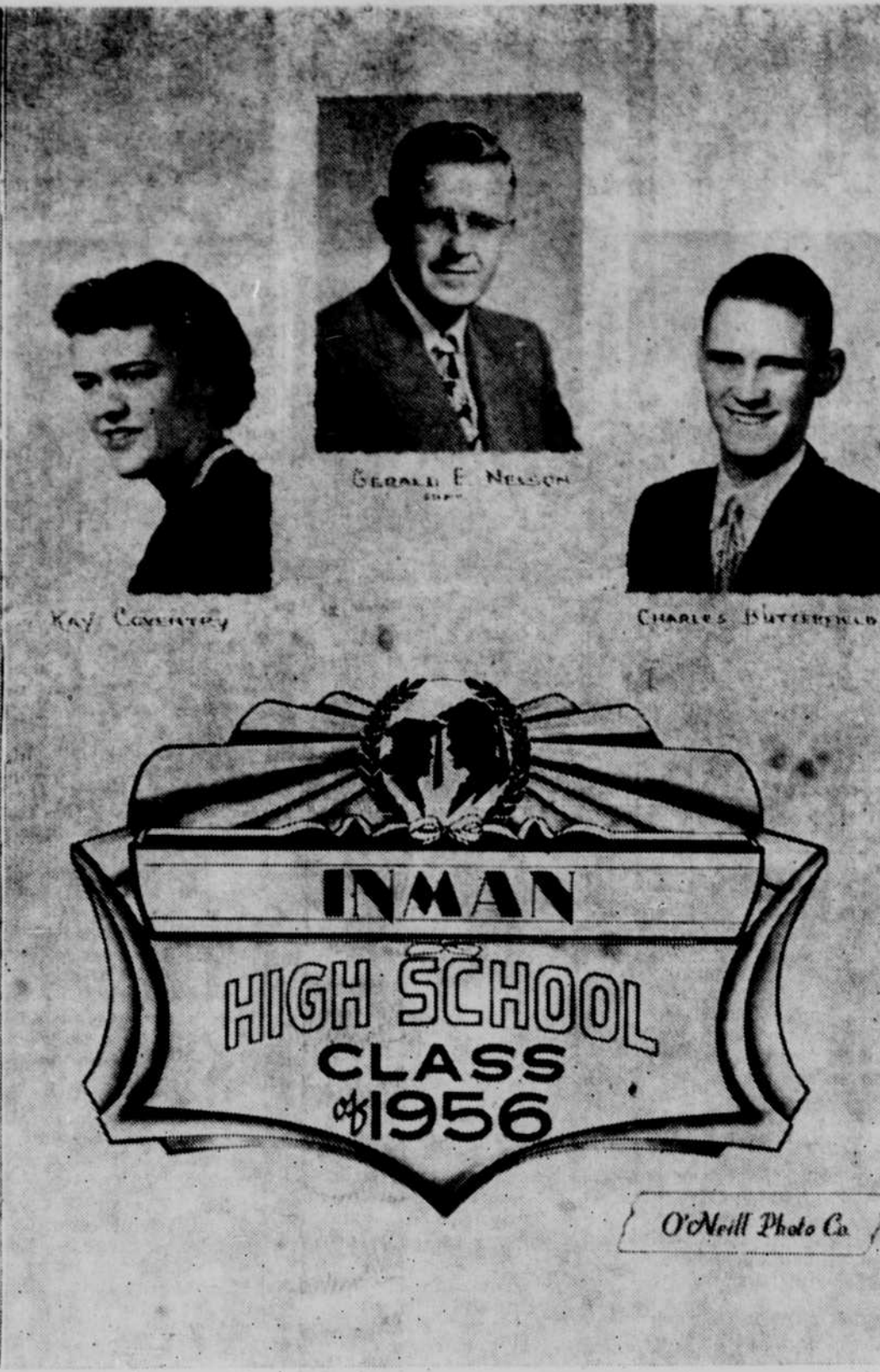
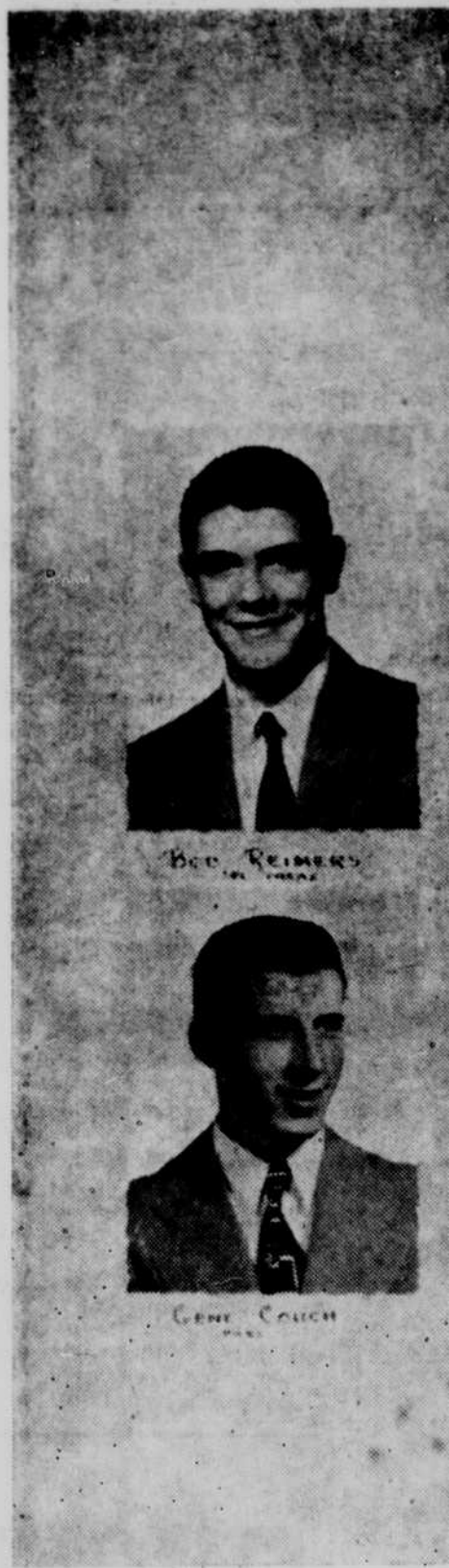

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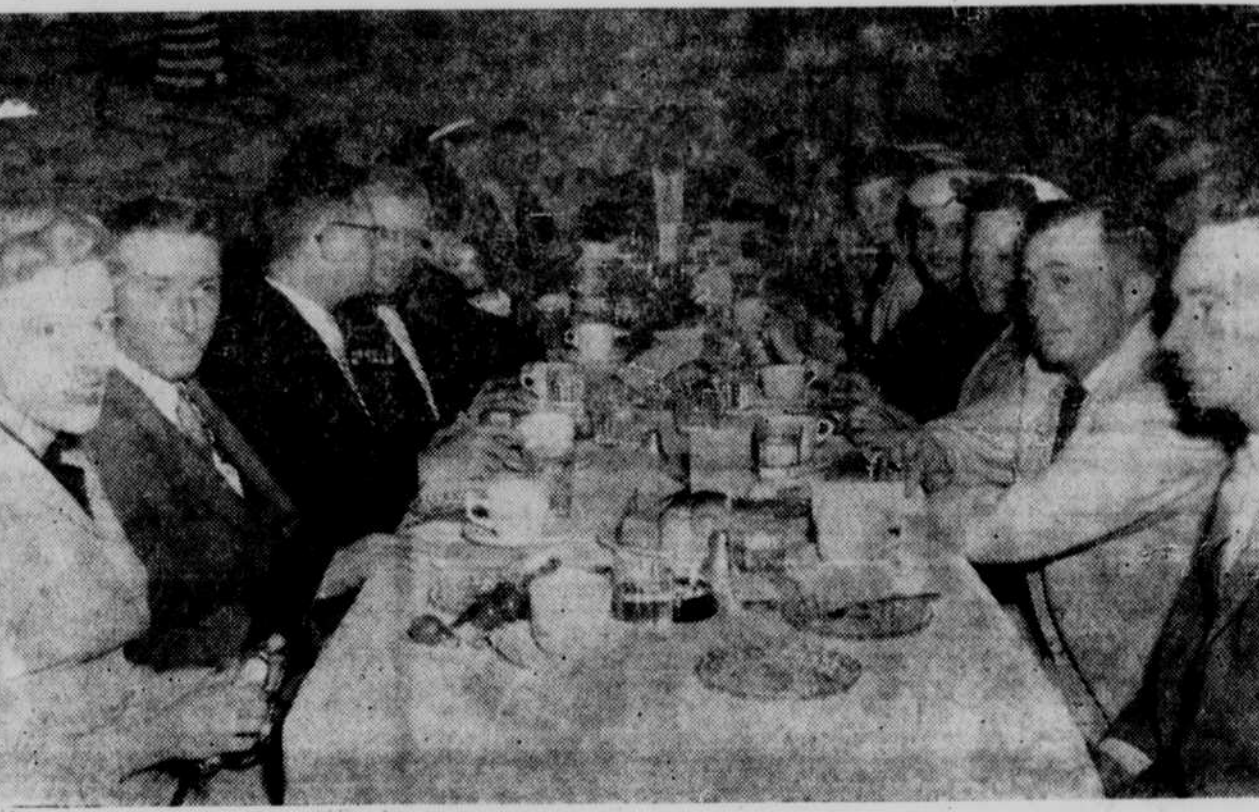
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Class of 1946 in 10th Anniversary Reunion
