Enlarged Bank Credit Is Noted

A year of high-level business activity has generated enlarged demands for bank credit at Federal Reserve member banks in

Nebraska. Condition statements released by the Federal Reserve Bank of Kansas City, Mo., show total loans increased 23 million or about 6 percent in the year ending April 10.

Increased borrowing by business was an important factor contributing to this credit increase, as business loans rose \$18 million. Loans to consumers, led by growth in building activity is reflected in the \$8 million increase in real estate loans.

Loans to farmers declined \$17 million, however, principally due to a reduction in crop loans guaranteed by the Commodity Credit Corporation.

Funds available for lending have been relatively scarce the past year, and a loss of \$26 million in deposits added to the scarcity, the condition statement shows.
