Foil Keeps Potatoes Piping Hot

If you hate to use the broiler because of the cleanup job, put a sheet of foil over the broiler and strip it off when the broiling is done. It doesn't mean you skip cleaning the broiler pan, but it does help.

I always like to wrap the potatoes that I bake in foil before broiling them. I have a good reason for this—I have a family notorious for being late for meals and the foil keeps the potatoes piping hot if the family doesn't show up just when they are baked.

If I fry a pan of pork chops, or something similar, I sometimes heat the plate, put the meat on it and use foil as a plate cover, fitting it tightly all the way around. It helps to keep the food hot much longer that way.

If it's mashed potatoes we're having, and the family doesn't show up in time, I put them into the top of the double boiler with hot water underneath to keep them warm for serving.

I learned long ago to put the ingredients for a green salad into a bowl and cover it and put it back into the refrigerator, putting the salad dressings in containers on the table. Then, when the late comers arrive, their salad is reasonably crisp and they can choose with their preference in salad dressings.

If you're going on a vacation this summer you will find it convenient to put just enough soap in several ordinary envelopes to do a wash bowl laundry. Be sure to add some water softener to the soap in the envelope because there will be hard water at many of the places where you'll stop.

You'll find plastic bags for soiled clothing, extra pairs of shoes and other things, very handy on a trip. Makes or cleaner traveling, and with children, wet clothes or a wet washcloth can be put into the plastic bag. Incidentally, start out on a trip with children with some brand new games that can be played in a car. And ration them carefully. Don't let the children have them all the first day. Don't buy out the first souvenir shop you see and don't buy anything you'll just have to put in the attic when you get home. Buy souvenirs sensibly, with an eye to future decoration or use and try to get one from each state that isn't put in a dust catcher. Try to buy souvenirs that are really indicative of the state and you'll not regard them as just junk when you get home.

\$2,233 in Fines from Patrol Work

Troopers of the O'Neill-Valentine state highway patrol area covered approximately 200 miles of U.S. highway 20 and all feeder roads into it from north and south. For the month of May, 1956, the troopers in this area traveled 21,885 miles, making 801 contacts. Of these contacts, 133 resulted in summonses to court being issued and netting \$2,233.50 in fines.

Five hundred violation cards were issued to correct vehicle defects and 108 warnings were given for faulty driving.

This activity required 95 hours of overtime. Eight accidents were covered in this area. To date in 1956 this area has had two fatalities — one in Boyd and one in Cherry county.

Gain of 21,000 Families Cited

Nebraska's population of registered passenger cars will increase by more than 68,000 and there will be a gain of 21,000 families in the state by 1965, according to a study by the state's largest independent automobile finance company.

An analysis of the expected growth in the state's population and in family income—without considering other important economic trends at work — points convincingly to higher levels of prosperity in the future.

Passenger car registrations by 1965 should total more than 542,000, a 14 percent increase over 474,000 now registered, the survey shows.

Establishes \$1,000 Jesuit Scholarship
