

Old House Is Moved 30 Miles

Have you eaten a lot of garden peas and want to try some a new way? Or maybe you want to use some frozen peas, or canned peas differently? Then have a try at this recipe for baked onions and peas. It will serve six.

BAKED ONIONS AND PEAS

Twelve small onions, two tablespoons butter, three tablespoons flour, 1 1/4 cups milk, salt, pepper, two cups peas, one cup corn flakes (buttered).

Cook the onions in salted water until tender and drain. Arrange in a buttered baking dish. Make white sauce with butter, flour and milk and 1/4 cup liquid from the peas. Season, add the peas, pour over onions. Cover with corn flakes and bake in a moderate oven of 375 F. for 25 minutes.

Tired of the same old ways of

using left over potatoes? Here's a baked dish that is a bit different.

DELMONICO POTATOES

Two tablespoons butter, 1 1/2 tablespoons flour, one cup milk, 1/2 teaspoon salt, 1/4 teaspoon pepper, one quart boiled potatoes (sliced), three hard cooked eggs (chopped), 1/2 cup American cheese (grated), chopped pimento (optional), two tablespoons butter, salt, pepper, 1/4 cup American cheese (grated).

Make white sauce with butter, flour and milk. Add salt and pepper. Arrange layers of potatoes, eggs, cheese, pimentos and white sauce in buttered baking dish. Dot each layer with butter, salt and pepper. Cover top with cheese. Bake in a moderate oven of 350 F. until done.

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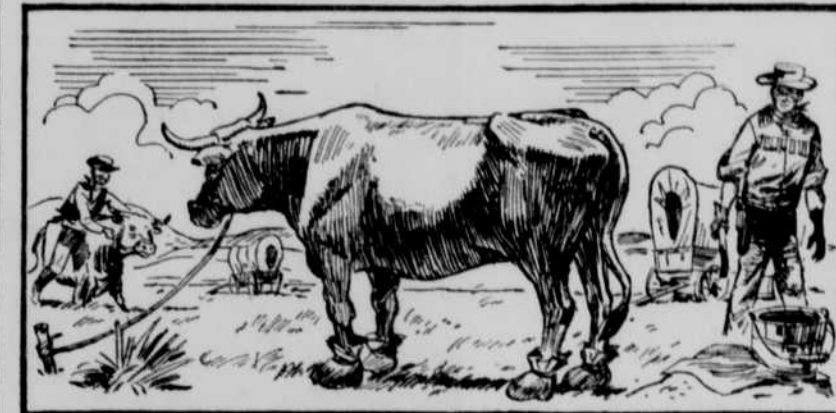
